



The Minister writes:

This is the first magazine of 2014, so I would like to begin with wishing you a Happy New Year.

This is a very significant month in the life of the community in Stanley. As you will see elsewhere, it is the month when the old church building will begin to be dismantled. It will be a great loss to the sky line of the village and many people have fond memories of special occasions celebrated there. We are inviting people to a service to commemorate the building on 9th February at 3pm.

We have been very encouraged by the support and help as we are planning a legacy for the site of the old building. We are determined that there will continue to be a sacred space where people can come just to sit quietly or to pray. We are commissioning Groundworks to take the ideas that have come from the community and turn them into a workable plan. This will need to take account of ongoing maintenance as well as making it a safe place to be.

As the plans develop we will have consultation days to enable people to give their responses. As well as coming up with inspired designs, we will also need the resources to put them into practice. Already people have been offering to contribute, either their time and skills, or by offering funds. The more we can work together to put the plans into place, the more it will be a genuine community project that will be sustainable and we can be proud of. Let us know if you would like to help.

Looking to the future, there is the opportunity and challenge to continue to develop a place of worship in Stanley. From the outside, architecturally, the church centre is clearly a school. We are looking for ways to transform its identity so that it is clearly a place of Christian worship as well as a place to serve the community in other ways. We have commissioned an architect, Liz Ashmore, and a liturgical consultant, Revd Richard Giles, to help with this. We would also welcome ideas from the village, so if you feel inspired, please get in touch.

A new look for the Church Centre

St Peter's Church has been awarded £4,000 from Waste Recycling Environmental (WREN) and landfill operator FCC Environment to put towards a project of work to fit new floor coverings throughout the church. The floors are very tatty and uneven in places, and it is hoped that new flooring throughout the centre will give a cleaner, more professional and inviting image to our Community Café customers, and the groups and individuals that use the centre every week.

Heavy duty entrance matting will be installed at both entrances of the long corridor, and the rest of the corridor will be fitted with carpeting which will be continued into the 'middle room'. The café room will be fitted with new vinyl, which will be continued up the steps to the toilet area. The office will also be fitted with new carpet.

It's time to say goodbye to the old church

Demolition of the old church is expected to start on Monday 10th February. It will be very sad, and strange, when the church is gone: in its present form, it has been an imposing landmark in Stanley for nearly 100 years and many people will treasure memories of attending significant events there: family weddings, baptisms and funerals.

Rev Bill Henderson will be holding a Commemoration Service next to the old church on <u>Sunday 9th February at 3pm</u>, to acknowledge these memories and to give thanks for how the building has served our community. As it will be an outdoor service, please dress appropriately with suitable footwear. After the service, everyone is welcome to come back to the Church on Lake Lock Road for refreshments and to continue sharing thoughts and memories.

Many items including the war memorial, pulpit, font and font cover have already been removed from the church and are being stored safely. Protective covers have been built around the graves nearest the building to guard them from damage. The Diocese has applied for planning permission to build a temporary road from Aberford Road up to the church to facilitate the demolition. However, the movement of lorries will be kept to a minimum, and in fact the majority of the stone is expected to be crushed on site, and used to fill the crypt.

Discussions are continuing about how the site can be landscaped for the future, which hopefully will include an outline of the old church, seating, and a new home for the war memorial. Groundworks have already been commissioned to prepare a preliminary design.

Demolition of the church was approved by the Church Commissioners after a long process of public consultation and an appeal.

Cracks in the church appeared only 15 years after it was rebuilt after the fire of 1911, and it has been propped up from the inside since the 1930's. Over the decades, the situation worsened, until the building became structurally unsound and dangerous. The congregation moved out in 2001 and a planning application to save the façade of the building and convert the interior into flats failed. Further attempts to find a developer for the site also failed, and so the Church Commissioners moved to have the church demolished.

Although the old church as a building will no longer exist, it is important to remember that St Peter's church as a body of people is very much alive, and serving the community. It is important that there is a building that can be recognised as the home for this worshipping community and as a sacred space in the village. We are looking at ways of making the building we use now much more suitable.

In the next couple of months, there will be an exhibition at the church on Lake Lock Road of photographs and memorabilia of the old church to which everyone is invited to contribute items. This will also be an opportunity to review the plans for the landscaping of the old church site.

Finally, the poem below was written about the old church, and is reprinted with permission from Wally Barnsley, of Selby:

Though I seem to crumble I kneel before God in prayer To salute the people of Stanley For the joy that we did share

An obelisk of darkened stone Though once stood proud and tall Say one last prayer for me Before I finally fall. G.J.A. Barnsley

Henry Fonda, in his last film role, is Norman Thayer, a prickly English professor of 80, holidaying with his wife Ethel (Katherine Hepburn) at their summer house on Golden Pond, New England. Out of the blue, their daughter Chelsea (Jane Fonda) turns up with her new fiancée Billy Ray (Doug McKeon) and his 12 year old son. The generation gap is soon highlighted with Norman and Billy clashing frequently and fiercely. However, as summer progresses, Norman begins to forge a close relationship with the boy that he never achieved with Chelsea and begins to realise how much happiness he missed out on with his own daughter. The film is a masterpiece of storytelling, with beautiful, touching performances: Fonda and Hepburn were rewarded with Academy Awards for Best Actor and Best Actress for their roles.

Women's World Day of Prayer

"Streams in the Desert"

Women's World Day of Prayer is a international, inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the voices of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is extensive. An international committee is based in New York and each participating country has its own national committee. Regional conferences meet to plan the service, and then finally, at a church near you on March 7th, women and men will gather to celebrate using a programme of worship offered this year by women in Egypt.

The theme of the service is "Streams in the Desert" and everyone is being asked to reflect on our Christian role of being a 'stream in the desert' for those who experience spiritual 'drought'. This service from Egypt has universal appeal.

Mentioned in Genesis, Egypt is one of the oldest civilisations in the world. In 2011, Hosni Mubarek was removed from power following the 'Arab Spring' uprising, which was a public reaction to growing unemployment, a failing economy and government corruption. The situation in Egypt remains volatile.

In 2010, the literacy rate for men was 80% for men, but only 63% for women, Women can go to work, go to university, vote and run in all elections. However, many rural adolescent girls are discouraged from completing school and face lives of early marriage, illiteracy and domestic abuse. Egypt has long been home to the Coptic Christians, and the Church in Egypt is doing all it can to counteract this. Political and social change affects individual lives and we will all pray with the women of Egypt for peace.

We envisage a great annual wave of prayer, rising with the sun over the island of Samoa and sweeping across Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas, coming to rest in American Samoa some 36 hours later. By then, the WWDP services will have been celebrated in over 170 countries.

All are welcome— men and women, and people of all ages—to the WWDP service at St Peter's Church, Lake Lock Road, at 7:30pm.



We are a nation of TV addicts: Only the Bulgarians watch more TV than we do, making the British Europe's second-biggest TV addicts, with a third of us watching more than three hours every day during the week. However, many of us skip the News. In fact, 13 per cent of us never watch any news or current affairs. The only two countries who avoid the News and current affairs more than we do are Israel and Slovenia. The results were disclosed in the recent European Social Survey.

We love food, but... One in three of us consider ourselves to be a 'foodie' – but half of us are so tired after a day at work that we cannot face the effort of cooking from scratch. And so while celebrity chefs whip up tantalising meals on the TV screen, most of us are watching them over a dish of pasta, baked potatoes, stir fries, or other easy and quickly made meals. It seems that the average adult owns nine cookbooks and watches 121 hours of cookery programmes a year. But the average adult also has a repertoire of just six everyday meals, and one in four of us even resorts to eating cereal one night a week.
