The Minister writes:

For the last few years, the March magazine has been published as we begin Lent. Once again we have an opportunity to use this month as a preparation for the great festival of Easter, with the powerful theme of death and resurrection. A theme that we see in life around us.

We have seen the dismantling of the old church, with the main part of the building coming down very quickly. I would like to say thank you to those who came to the outdoor service on February 9th, despite the appalling weather. A number of people have asked for copies of the service and these are available at the church centre. As people shared memories, we heard of a couple who had to get married in the crypt because an air raid was going on. I later got a letter from someone who was married in 1945, but was only discharged from hospital the night before, and had to report to hospital in Blackpool on his honeymoon. We would like to keep a record of peoples memories and photos and have some of them exhibited in church.

As the old church is taken down we are breathing new life into the church centre. We have just been able to lay new flooring, due to the support of local funders, and the effect is a dramatic improvement. As I said in last months letter, we are looking for ways to transform its identity from a school so that it is clearly a place of Christian worship as well as a place to serve the community in other ways. This is another opportunity for the community to work together and achieve something that we can be proud of and serve future generations.

Death and resurrection is a theme we see in nature, partly through the changing seasons, but also through cultivation. Cutting back plants is a way of encouraging growth, as is digging out weeds and spreading fertiliser. In our spiritual life there are many ways of applying these principles. Cutting back can give us a positive reason for giving things up. Jesus was particularly good at spending time in prayer so he knew what to say no to. The digging up of weeds can also be a picture of cutting out things in our life that are not helpful.

Let this Lent be a time for growth, as we ask the Holy Spirit to make us restless till we change, and prepare for the glorious celebration of Easter.



The Way I See It

The Eiffel Tower was opened 125 years ago this month. It was actually the entrance arch to the 1889 World Fair and named after its builder, Gustave Eiffel. At 324 metres it was the tallest structure in the world. It kept that title until 1930, when the Chrysler Building in New York was opened. However, very few buildings have eclipsed its global appeal; over 250 million people have visited it, and is recognised the world over as the defining image of France.

Of course since 1930 many taller buildings have been erected, in America, Europe, the Far East and the Middle East. There are some pretty tall ones on London, for that matter. In fact, the competition to build the tallest building continues to this day.

It's a trait beautifully captured in the story of the Tower of Babel in the Bible (Genesis 11:1-9). It probably relates to a period when men in the Middle East were very keen to build ziggurats - great rectangular stepped buildings, sometimes topped with a temple. In the biblical story, human beings (men, I'm sure) had the bright idea of building a ziggurat so big that it would have its top in the heavens. Thus, they hoped, they would 'make a name for themselves'. Their plan was thwarted by the Lord, who 'confused their language', leaving the would-be builders at odds with each other and the project hopeless. "They left off building the city", Genesis wryly observes.

It's a strange story, but it neatly captures a familiar human ambition: the desire to be 'top'. Over the centuries, it has caused enormous suffering: jealousies, revolutions, assassinations, wars and plots. In the long term it cannot bring happiness or satisfaction. When Jesus caught his disciples arguing about rank and status, asking "Who is the greatest?", he soon put them right: "Whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all" (Mark 10:33-34).

Lent starts early in March. A time, perhaps, for reassessing our own ambitions, including any lurking desire to be the 'greatest' or to own the 'biggest'. Small is beautiful, and so is the role of the faithful servant. I must admit, however, that I still love the Eiffel Tower (and secretly wish I'd built it).

We said goodbye to the old church

Over 150 people gathered in the wind and the rain for the farewell service at the old church on Sunday 9th February. It was a very poignant service with various people sharing their memories of the building. The discussions continued at the church on Lake Lock Road afterwards over refreshments.

The very next day, the workmen started dismantling the church and it was incredible to watch the swift reduction of the church to a huge pile of stones over the course of just a few days. The building had been a landmark in our community for nearly 100 years and it will take some time to get used to the space that now exists on the hillside.

Copies of the order of service used on 9th February are still available if anyone would like one as a memento. Please call into the church on Lake Lock Road: the copies are on the long table in the corridor.

Due to the wet weather, the contractors have been unable to construct the temporary access road from Aberford Road as planned, due to the risk of damaging unmarked graves, and have been using Church Road instead. However, the ground has now started to dry out and soon the access road will be put in place, meaning that the stone crusher can be brought on to site and work can begin on crushing the stone and filling the crypt.

Groundworks have been commissioned to prepare a preliminary design for the landscaping of the site, to include an outline of the old church, seating and a new home for the war memorial. There will be an opportunity to review and comment on these plans in due course.

Women's World Day of Prayer

On March 7th, women, men and children from 170 countries across the world will gather to celebrate Women's World Day of Prayer using a programme of worship that is offered this year by Christian women in Egypt.



The theme of this year's service is "Streams in the Desert" and everyone is being asked to reflect on our Christian role of being a 'stream in the desert' for those who experience spiritual 'drought'. This service from Egypt has universal appeal.

The political situation in Egypt has been volatile ever since the Arab Spring uprising in 2011 which removed Hosni Mubarek from power. Women are allowed to work and to go to university but many girls from rural areas are discouraged from completing school and face lives of early marriage, illiteracy and domestic abuse. We will pray with all the women of Egypt for peace, justice and equality.

The WWDP service at St Peter's Church will be led by Calli McKenna, and everyone—women, men and people of all ages—is warmly invited to come along.

1st March: St David's Day – time for daffodils

St David's Day is on 1st March and it is traditional for the Welsh to wear daffodils or leeks. Shakespeare called this custom 'an honourable tradition begun upon an honourable request', but nobody knows the reason. Why should anyone have ever 'requested' that the Welsh wear leeks or daffodils to honour their patron saint? It's a mystery!

We do know that David—or Dafydd—of Pembrokeshire was a monk and bishop of the 6th century. In the 12th century he was made patron of Wales, and he has the honour of being the only Welsh saint to be canonised and culted in the Western Church. Tradition has it that he was austere with himself, and generous with others, living on water and vegetables (leeks, perhaps?!) and devoting himself to works of mercy. He was much loved.

Last month, the whole school took part in the national Sign2Sing fundraising initiative. About 300,000 children and adults from across the UK were attempting to set the Guinness World Record for the most people singing and signing at the same time. The objective was also to raise money for the Sign Health charity which supports deaf people in the community. The children had great fun learning and performing the songs and raised £103 in aid of the Sign Health charity.

This month we are very excited to be welcoming Ed Balls MP to the school. He will be meeting the staff and children, looking at some of the work they have done in class, and they will also be performing some songs for him.

There will be an open evening in our Foundation unit for prospective parents on Tuesday, 11th March from 3.30pm-4.30pm. This is an excellent opportunity to look around our Foundation unit, and to meet the staff.

Last month, the whole school went on an outing, class by class, to visit the old St Peter's Church before the dismantling work began. Class 5 will be holding an African evening later this month. They will be performing traditional African songs accompanied by drums and dances that they have choreographed themselves. There will also be African food and presentations about the continent. The event will be raising money for Literacy in a Box; a charity that supports educational initiatives in Africa.

Also this month, Year 5 and 6 pupils will be going on a 3-day residential trip to the Lake District, where they will take part in some exciting outdoor activities, such as archery, bushcraft, team challenges and orienteering.


