

The Minister writes:

It is still very strange driving around Stanley without the old church as a landmark and reference. It is going to be a while before we get used to its absence. The Easter story reminds us of the possibility for New Life out of death: that painful loss can lead to a future with hope.

Plans are still being formulated for the site of the old church. We will be looking at what can be done with the stone we are left with and ideas will be on display for peoples comment.

Looking to the future, there is the opportunity and challenge to continue to develop a place of worship in Stanley. From the outside, architecturally, the church centre is clearly a school and is set back from the street so lacks visibility. We are looking for ways to transform its identity so that it is clearly a place of Christian worship as well as a place to serve the community in other ways.

This is an opportunity to think about what is important for us, as we meet together to worship and perhaps looking at different ways from those we have used before. The church is not a building, but the people from the community who follow Christ. We are the church when we gather to worship, and we are also the church when we scatter to our homes and places of work. We have rich



symbols to aid our worship, the cross, water, lit candles, bread and wine, the bible and many more. There is a challenge in using these symbols well to help our understanding of the living God.

The challenge of developing the Centre is for the whole community. We want to develop a plan that will be inspiring and be one that people want to support. We will need to work with the council over getting long term security for the site. Then of course the resources to make the plans a reality. Please pray with us as we take these next steps in our life together and look forward to a future of new life and hope.



It's time for the Annual General Meeting!!

St Peter's Church will hold it's Annual General meeting on Sunday 27th April at 12pm after the morning service at the Church on Lake Lock Road. It is an important event in the life of the church: it sets out the church's plans for the year ahead, as well as reviewing what has happened over the past year.

One of the important tasks is to elect the churchwardens for the year. They are the Bishop's agents in the parish and represent all parishioners. The members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) which helps run the church, are also elected. Everyone who is on the electoral roll of the church is entitled to vote in these elections. Anyone who lives in the parish of Stanley can ask to join the electoral roll (you also have to be over 16, and have been baptised): you don't have to be a regular attendee at church.

The church's financial accounts will also be presented and discussed at the AGM. You can discover how much we will need to pay the Diocese next year and how the church proposes to meet these costs.

Rev Bill Henderson will report on what has happened in the past 12 months and his plans for the future. Various other reports will be presented e.g. by the PCC, the Cubs & Scouts, Brownies, Rainbows, the Ladies Society, and the church wardens.

If you want to learn about what St Peter's church does, what it's ministry is all about, where we get out money from and how we spend it, and what the various church officers do, please come along to our AGM. You may be surprised to learn how much goes on!

The Silver Line

A free, 24 hour, confidential helpline for older people

The statistics about older people and loneliness are frightening. More than half of all 75 year olds in the UK live alone and one in ten suffers 'intense' loneliness but is reluctant to ask for help.

The Silver Line was launched by Esther Rantzen in November 2013 after a very successful pilot project in the north-east: some callers rang late at night to say 'I just wanted to someone to say goodnight to'. Many said that the small hours of the night, and the long hours of Sunday were very bleak, if you were alone.

Christmas, many said, was particularly painful. Esther spoke to one elderly gentleman on Christmas Day who said that she was the first person he'd spoken to all day. When she rang him back a week later, he told her that she was the only person he'd spoken to throughout Christmas and New Year.

Loneliness can cause serious damage, physically and mentally, and yet there is a huge stigma attached to admitting to being lonely and a reluctance amongst older people to ask for help.

The Silver Line is a confidential, free helpline for older people across the UK, open every day and night of the year. The specially trained staff:

- Offer information, friendship and advice
- Link callers to local groups and services
- Offer regular befriending calls
- Protect and support those suffering abuse or neglect.

There is no age limit for callers, although most people who phone the helpline are over 65. Callers can be put in touch with Silver Line friends, and receive regular weekly friendship calls or emails.

Why we should be like donkeys

Are you a pet-lover? Many people own a dog, a cat or a budgie, but most of us don't own a donkey! Yet in Bible times, donkeys were essential to daily life. They did everything from helping to grind corn, to ploughing, to carrying people, to transporting their belongings.



Despite their small frame, donkeys are surprisingly tough. They are content with poor fodder like thistles, and can travel an average of 20 miles a day.

There are two occasions in the Christian calendar where donkeys walk into the picture. At Christmas, Mary travelled the 100 miles from Nazareth to Bethlehem on a donkey. And although a donkey doesn't get a specific mention in the manger story, that same one that transported her was probably there; where else would it have been?

On Palm Sunday Jesus entered Jerusalem riding on a donkey. Jesus deliberately chose this animal rather than a horse. Why? In Bible times, the horse was associated with war, conquest and worldly might. But the donkey was a symbol of peace and humility. Jesus used this animal to show that he had come with the dignity of the king of peace. His entry into the Holy City also fulfilled Zechariah's prophecy concerning the Messiah: "...behold, your king coming unto you; he is just, and having salvation; lowly, and riding upon a donkey, even upon a colt, the foal of a donkey" (Zech 9:9).

Donkeys are hardworking and undemanding. They wait for their master to put them to the work he has chosen for them. And, remarkably, each one bears the mark of the Cross on their backs!

Perhaps that is something we should learn—to wait for Jesus our Master, to be always obedient to him, to serve him with all our hearts, and to bear the mark of his grace in our lives.

Don't believe everything people tell you in the afternoon

Here is an unexpected finding: apparently people are more likely to cheat you in the afternoon, rather than in the morning! This is because our capacity for self-control diminishes during the day. The study was carried out at Harvard University.

Last month we were very excited to welcome Ed Balls MP into our school to meet the staff and the children and to look at some of their work. He also amused the Class 5 children by having a go on their djembe (African) drums! The whole school performed a number of songs for him—he said he was very impressed with their singing and that it was some of the best he had ever heard in a school!

Also last month, Class 5 put on an African evening for family and friends. They performed African songs and dances and served some African food. The event was to raise money for Literacy in a

Box, a UK charity that supports educational initiatives in Africa. A grand total of £132 was raised which was a fantastic achievement. The children have also written to a school in Zambia and are looking forward to receiving some replies.

The 3-day residential trip to the Lake District for our Year 5 and 6 pupils was an enormous success. The children took part in lots of exciting outdoor activities, such as archery, team challenges and orient-eering. They all returned very tired but happy, and rather muddy!

All in the month of April....

- 125 years ago, on 16th April 1889: Charlie Chaplin was born

- 25 years ago, on 15th April 1989: the Hillsborough disaster in Sheffield, in which 96 Liverpool fans were killed in a crush during the FA Cup semi-final against Nottingham Forest.
- 20 years ago, on 6th April 1994: a plane carrying the Presidents of Burundi and Rwanda was shot down over Kigali, triggering the Rwandan Genocide in which more than 500,000 people were killed.
- 20 years ago, on 26th April 1994: Nelson Mandela was elected president in the first multiracial elections in South Africa.
- 15 years ago, on 26th April 1999: Jill Dando, British TV newsreader and presenter was murdered on her doorstep.

Memories of the Church on the Hill

Clearance work is continuing on the site of the old church. Enough stone has been put aside to build an outline of the building, and the stone crusher has started to crush the stone that will be used to fill the crypt.

Groundworks have been commissioned to prepare a preliminary design for the landscaping of the site, to include an outline of the old church, seating and a new home for the war memorial. There will be an opportunity to review and comment on these plans in due course.

The loss of the old church continues to prompt memories from many people, particularly from those who were very involved in the life of the church before it was closed.

Jennifer Terry, whose parents Jack and Flora Barber were dedicated members of the church for many many years, has written with her thoughts about the demolition:

I have just heard that the beautiful church on the hill has now gone; what a very sad time for the village. It will hold so many happy memories for a lot of people, and especially my family.

For my parents, it was their life, and also mine and my sister's life until we left the village. It will be fifty years this June since we were both married there.

A garden of remembrance will be lovely, where people can go and sit with their memories.


