The Minister writes:

Thank you to everyone who worked so hard to make our Summer Gala such a success, and thank you to all who came to support us, despite the rather miserable weather.

The gala is always timed to be as near as possible to the feast day of St Peter, our patron saint, which is celebrated every year on 29th June. St Peter's school began the celebrations with a special service in school followed by a sleepover, which was a great success. It is always helpful to remember some of the stories about St Peter, and be encouraged in our own journey of faith.

I find that I am most encouraged by the times when Peter messed up. When we are honest we can all admit to doing things that we regret or are ashamed of, just like St Peter. At the school service we retold the story of Jesus walking on the lake in the midst of a storm. Peter, full of courage, follows Jesus's call to step out of the boat and walk on the water too. At first it goes well as he walks towards Jesus. Then he notices the wind and waves and becomes afraid and begins to sink. Fortunately Jesus is there to help him back into the boat as the wind dies down and all becomes calm.

Most people will remember that Peter famously denied knowing Jesus three times, despite saying he would always be there for him. Again Jesus lifts him up when he forgives him on the beach after His resurrection.

Therefore, we can identify with Peter's humanity and know that, as Jesus helped him, he can help us too. I am reading a book about a church that has the motto, "No perfect people allowed". It is really about being authentic. This

means if we have doubts it is good to admit them but also be willing to talk about them. It means acknowledging that none of us are perfect, so we can accept each other as we are; but also that we can encourage each other in seeking the help of Jesus to become more like Him.

The Great War: the war poets

Last month, we saw how the songs of the music halls mirrored—and even shaped—the public mood about the war. At the same time some of the finest young British poets were serving at the front, writing poetry that they never expected to be published, storing it in diaries or in letters home. Some of the more familiar names are Wilfred Owen,

Rupert Brooke, and Laurence Binyon who was not a soldier but an Oxford academic, and who in the early months of the War wrote a poem which contains perhaps the best known lines of English poetry:

They grow not old, as we that are left grow old; Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.



THE GREAT WAR 1914 - 1918

Brooke's 'The Soldier' ('If I should die think only this of me') is a beautifully crafted and deeply moving sonnet, suggesting that had he lived he would have held a high place among English lyric poets. But today it is the anger, frustration and utter despair of his fellow poets in the trenches which has made their work memorable. Owen's 'Anthem for Doomed Youth', or his even angrier 'Dulci et decorum est', a bitter rejection of the notion that it is 'sweet and honourable to die for your country', powerfully capture the horror of war. Many of them, including Brooke, Owen and Rosenberg, were killed in action, Owen in the last few days of the War.

For the most part it was probably a decade after the war's end before their truthful but deeply disturbing work began to be fully recognised and honoured. It's not surprising that in the aftermath of war, with virtually every family in the country bereaved, the preference was to remember acts of valour and the hard-won victory rather than the slaughter and suffering that it entailed. The hymn 'O Valiant Hearts' was enormously popular at that time: 'In glorious hope their proud and sorrowing land/ commits her children to thy gracious hand'.

This year as we remember 100 years since the beginning of World War 1, many people are turning again to the Great War poets. It may be that only now, a century later, can we see the strange paradox

that the most brutal of wars could also produce wonderful acts of valour and self-sacrifice, and the muddy trenches of battle some of the finest poetry of modern times.

15th July: St Swithun's Day - saint for a rainy day

St Swithun (or Swithin) is apparently the saint you can blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15 July, it will then rain for forty days after that. It all began when he was made Bishop of Winchester in 852 by King Ethelwulf of Wessex. It was an important posting: Winchester was the capital of Wessex, and during the 10 years Swithun was there, Wessex became the most important kingdom of England.

During his life, instead of washing out people's summer holidays, and damping down their spirits, Swithun seems to have done a lot of good. He was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, he asked that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door.

If he had been left there in peace, who knows how many rainy summers the English may have been spared over the last 1000 years. But, no, it was decided to move Swithun. By now, the 960s, Winchester had become the first monastic cathedral chapter in England, and the newly installed monks wanted Swithun in the cathedral with them. So finally, on 15 July 971, his bones were dug up and Swithun was translated into the cathedral.

That same day many people claimed to have had miraculous cures. Certainly everyone got wet, for the heavens opened. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun. Swithun was moved again in 1093, into the new Winchester cathedral. His shrine was a popular place of pilgrimage throughout the middle ages. The shrine was destroyed during the Reformation, and restored in 1962. There are 58 ancient dedications to Swithun in England.

'12 Years a Slave' (2013) 15 Rating

'12 Years a Slave' won three Academy Awards, including Best Picture, Best Supporting Actress (Lupita Nyong'o) and Best Adapted Screenplay, and also won a Golden Globe for Best Motion Picture, and BAFTAs for Best Leading Actor (Chiwetel Ejiofor) and Best Film. Directed by Steve McQueen, the film follows the experience of Solomon Northup (Ejiofor), an African-American living with his wife and two children in Saratoga, New York, who is kidnapped and sold into slavery by men claiming to offer him work as a circus musician. Transported by ship to New Orleans, he is given a new name and sold to William Ford (Benedict Cumberbatch), a relatively empathetic slave owner. But confrontations lead to him being passed on to the abusive and alcoholic planter Edwin Epps (Michael Fassbender). Solomon decides to cease fighting against the illegitimacy of his situation and eventually salvation is offered to him by a kindly labourer named Bass (Brad Pitt).

4th August – Time for Lights Out!

Every householder in Britain is being asked to turn out their lights at 11pm on 4th August, to mark the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War.

The nationwide event is based on the famous comment attributed to Sir Edward Grey, the Foreign Secretary, on the eve of the conflict in 1914. He said: "The lamps are going out all over Europe; we shall not see them lit again in our lifetime." He made the remark the day before war was declared, as he gazed across St James's Park from his window at the Foreign Office at the gas lamps being lit.

The switch-off is being called Lights Out, and is backed by the

Government as "one of the most dramatic UK-wide events ever organised." Throughout the UK, everyone is being invited to "turn off their lights and to replace them with one single light, to remember a day that changed the world forever."



The 'Lights Out' will take place at the same time as a candlelit vigil of prayers, readings and music held in Westminster Abbey. There, candles will be extinguished one by one until a single flame is snuffed out at 11pm.

Dioceses vote in favour of women bishops

The Church of England's dioceses have now all voted in favour of the current draft legislation to enable women to be bishops. In 2011 both London and Chichester diocesan synods voted against the legislation. The February 2014 meeting of General Synod referred the current Women in the Episcopate legislation to the dioceses.

Diocesan Synods all voted in favour of the motion 'That this Synod approve the proposals embodied in the draft Bishops and Priests (Consecration and Ordination of Women) Measure.' For the motion to be carried the houses of clergy and laity had to each vote, by a simple majority, in favour. The draft legislation will now go before General Synod in July for a Final Approval vote.

The Bishop of Rochester, James Langstaff, Chair of the Steering Committee for the Draft Legislation for Women in the Episcopate said: "The dioceses have now expressed their view very clearly and the matter now comes back to General Synod in July. I pray that the Synod will continue to approach this decision in a prayerful and generous way as we move towards voting on the proposal that women may be bishops in the Church of England."

Wakefield Eastern Relief Road planning application

Wakefield Council is preparing a planning application for the Wakefield Eastern Relief Road which will connect Doncaster Road with Aberford Road. The proposed route of the new road will be alongside the canal from Belle Vue, past Eastmoor and will connect with Aberford Road at the Bar Lane roundabout and at the bottom of Stanley hill, opposite the Shell petrol station. There will also be a spur which will connect with Ferry Lane.


There will be drop-in exhibitions about the new road on:


