This is the first magazine of 2015, so I would like to begin with wishing you a Happy New Year.

This time last year I was writing about the imminent dismantling of the old church building, and inviting people to a service that we held to commemorate its place in the community. We had a really good turn out, so thank you to those who supported that, and came to tea at the Centre afterwards. It was a moving service and I was encouraged by the number of people who came

We are determined that the old site will continue to be a sacred space where people can come to sit, reflect or pray. We are working with Groundworks to take the ideas that have come from the community and turn them into a workable plan to include the War Memorial and an attractive seating area. We are now looking for funding to take the plans forward. People have been offering to contribute, either with funds or with time and skills. The more we can work together to put the plans into place, the more it will be a genuine community project that will be sustainable and we can be proud of. Let us know if you would like to help.

With the old building gone, there is the opportunity and challenge to continue to develop a place of worship in Stanley that people will want to use for the important occasions in life when people naturally turn to the church: weddings, baptisms and funerals. The place we are seeking to develop is the old nursery building we are using now. From the outside, architecturally it is clearly a school. We are looking for ways to transform its identity so that it is clearly a place of Christian worship as well as a place to serve the community in other ways.

The council have kindly agreed for an Asset Transfer of the building to us for 25 years. If we are going to do major work on it, it would be helpful to have a longer lease, and we are in discussions about that now. Please pray that they will be successful. We would welcome ideas from the village, so if you feel inspired, please get in touch.

Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent

This month sees the beginning of Lent, the 40 days of preparation running up to Easter. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, which this year falls on Wednesday 17th February.



The forty days of Lent is a reference to the forty days that Jesus spent in the desert fasting and praying, and preparing for his public ministry. He also taught his disciples to fast, so that they had time to focus on God and make time for prayer. Prayer and fasting often go hand in hand; 'So we fasted and petitioned our God about this, and he answered our prayer.' (Ezra 6:23)

Sometimes people might fast by missing a meal during the day to make time to seek God (although obviously this isn't suitable for some people). Others might refrain from TV or alcohol, or whatever else might get in the way of being fully focused on God.

In recent years, there have been campaigns to encourage people to start doing something during Lent, instead of giving something up. These might include carrying out a random act of kindness every day, or something more planned such as volunteering, or actively helping a neighbour in need.

Celebrate the start of Lent, and commit to giving something up, or starting something new, at the Ash Wednesday service at St Peter's Church on Wednesday 17th February at 7.30pm.

Women's World Day of Prayer Friday 6th March, 7:30pm, Parkside Methodist Church, Leeds Rd, Outwood





Jesus said to them: " Do you know what I have done to you?"

Women's World Day of Prayer is a international, inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the voices of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. Every year, a great wave of prayer rises with the sun over the island of Samoa and sweeps across Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas, coming to rest in American Samoa some 36 hours later. By then, the WWDP service will have been celebrated in over 170 countries.

This year, the service has been prepared by the women of the Bahamas and is entitled—'Jesus said to them: "Do you know what I have done to you?""

The Bahamas comprises 700 islands scattered over 100,000 square miles of water in the Atlantic ocean. Only a small number of the islands are populated, supporting a population of 353,600. The majority of people live on the main island of New Providence. About 86% of the population is descended from African slaves; the slave trade was abolished in 1802.

Whilst women have occupied some key roles in the government and law courts, women did not get the vote until 1962 and still have a low status in law. Mothers are expected to take sole responsibility for their families and husbands or partners, and are often punished more severely than men for the same crime. There are few work opportunities for women outside the domestic and hospitality industries.

The Bahamas is overwhelmingly Christian, and has been since 1647 when a group of English puritans settled on the islands. Today, the church helps in practical ways—running drug rehabilitation and programmes, and working with people with HIV and AIDS.

All are welcome—men and women, and people of all ages—to this year's local WWDP service, which will be held at Parkside Methodist Church, on Leeds Road in Outwood, at 7:30pm on Friday 6th March.

First Woman Bishop arrives in the Church of England

The Rt Revd Libby Lane became the first woman to be consecrated as a bishop in the Church of England on Monday 26th January. At a service at York Minster led by Dr John Sentamu, Archbishop of York, Libby became the 8th Bishop of Stockport.

Speaking in December when her appointment was first announced, she said: "I am grateful for, though somewhat daunted by, the confidence placed in me by the Diocese of Chester. This is unexpected and very exciting. I am very conscious of all those who have gone before me, women and men, who for decades have looked forward to this moment. But most of all I am thankful to God.

"The Church of England is called to serve all people of this country and, being present in every community, we communicate our faith best when our lives build up the lives of others, especially the most vulnerable. I am excited by the possibilities and challenges ahead."

She was ordained priest in 1994 and served a number of roles in the North of England, including as a hospital chaplain and as a chaplain in further education, before moving to the Diocese of Chester, and then becoming vicar of St Peter's Hale and St Elizabeth's Ashley, in 2007.

In 2013, she was elected as one of the first eight clergy women to sit as Participant Observers in the House of Bishops of the Church of England. In January 2010 she took on the role of Dean of Women in Ministry in Chester Diocese.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Revd Justin Welby, said: "Her Christcentred life, calmness and clear determination to serve the church and the community make her a wonderful choice."



And the Bishop of Chester, the Rt. Revd Dr Peter Forster, added: "As the first woman bishop in the Church of England she will face many challenges as well as enjoying many opportunities to be an ambassador for Jesus Christ. I have no doubt that she has the gifts and determination to be an outstanding bishop."

Bishop Libby is married to husband George, who is a Chaplain at Manchester Airport, and they have two grown up children.

Our new term is already well underway, with lots of exciting things to look forward. Firstly however, we were delighted with the success of our Christmas Fair which raised £711, some of which has already been used to purchase new play equipment. Many thanks to all the parents, staff and families for their support and generosity.

We were very proud of the school's position in the latest league tables. Out of 158 schools in Wakefield, Stanley Grove was 4th overall for children achieving level 4B+ at age 10/11 and 3rd for level 5+. This is an outstanding achievement, and shows that because of the efforts of our staff and pupils, our children are succeeding at levels expected for their age and above.

A group of our pupils recently took part in the annual Young Voices concert at Sheffield Arena with 7,000 other children from the surrounding area. All the children had been rehearsing for many months to learn all the songs and the actions, but the hard work paid off, because it was an excellent event and the children thoroughly enjoyed being part of it.

Class 3 will be visiting Leeds City Museum this term to support their class topic about Ancient Greece, and will also be receiving pedestrian training. Class 5 will be taking part in an Animation Creation workshop which will use iPads to enhance science learning, and our Year 5 and 6 children will be having a special assembly from Childline.

Other topics being studied this term include Ancient Egypt (Class 6), the Mayans and South America (Class 5), the Vikings (Class 4), Ancient Greece (Class 3), Elizabeth I and other famous people (Class 2), and Traditional Tales (Class 1). At the beginning of next month, the whole school will be celebrating World Book Day on 5th March with a range of fun activities.

We will also be continuing with our class assemblies—these are wonderful opportunities for the children to show their parents and the rest of the school what they have been working on.

All in the month of February....

Saluting Free Trade

This month we can celebrate two decades of the Fairtrade movement, founded back in 1995. Recent research showed that 78 per cent of the UK public now recognise the Fairtrade Mark, which stands for the world's largest and most recognised fair-trade system. Its aim is to secure a better deal for farmers and workers.

Based in Bonn, Germany, it sets international standards, organises support for producers around the world and promotes trade justice internationally.

The work of building a market for fair-trade products is carried out by national Fairtrade organisations across the world. There are such organisations not only in Europe but also in India, South Korea, Hong Kong and Kenya.

An independent company runs the Fairtrade certification system, ensuring that the relevant social and environmental standards are met for new raw materials and products. Here in the UK, the Fairtrade Foundation is an independent organisation that

provides independent certification that licenses use of the Fairtrade Mark on products in the UK.

The Foundation was established in 1992 by CAFOD, Christian Aid, Oxfam, Traidcraft and the National Federation of Women's Institutes (to name just a few).

The story of the Chaplain's Pennant in the Royal Navy

During the Dutch Wars in the 17th Century, when the English and Dutch fleets were engaged in a series of battles in the English Channel, both fleets were commanded by devoutly religious officers; Admiral Blake for the English and Admiral Tromp for the Dutch. They both ensured that every ship's company, before battle commenced, paused for prayers before the mast-head at the start of each day. The worry was that one side would steal an advantage over the other.

A solution was found when the two Admirals agreed that in both fleets the English and Dutch national flags would be sewn together and raised and lowered simultaneously at the start and finish of masthead prayers.

A century later, when Rear-Admiral Richard Kempenfelt devised a signalling system with flags for the Royal Navy, a Church (or Chaplain's) Pennant was created. Continuing the experience from the Dutch Wars, the Cross of St. George and the Dutch Tri-Colour were combined in a single pennant. During divine service or a burial at sea the pennant was to be flown from the Starboard outer yardarm.

By this time peace had been established between the English and the Dutch, so the pennant was now a more positive symbol of reconcil-


iation. It has remained the Church Pennant in the Royal Navy to this day.



Every time the Church Pennant is raised, during

ship's company prayers, the pennant is, in one sense, an uncomfortable reminder of the ambiguity of war, on sea or on land. Many on both sides of a conflict devoutly pray that God will give them victory, assuming God is on their side. Can God be on both sides at once?

Jesus has shown us where God is. He is alongside anyone caught up in the turmoil and agony of life's experience, redeeming us by his love', whichever side we are on, deserving or not. Like the woman being stoned by self-righteous Pharisees for being caught in the act of adultery; Jesus rescued her by his redeeming love. And God's love redeems in every human conflict. Enemies become allies. This is what the Royal Navy's Church Pennant ultimately came to demonstrate.




