The Minister writes:

I an spending the first part of this month in Kenya visiting our daughter, then will be travelling back to Tanzania to help with the 'Water for Life' project. It has been running for 7 years now and so far over £75,000 has been raised and sent to the project.

We began by helping train people to build hand dug wells and fit hand pumps to extract the water. There is also an important element of health education so that people understand the value of clean water. The purpose of the visit is to help evaluate the project, see what lessons can be learned and how to carry on into the future. I hope to get some good feedback from the local people about what has been helpful.

There are a number of challenges to make the project work. The first one is for the villagers to take responsibility for 'their' well in the long term so it will be maintained. Education is part of this so people will understand the health benefits. Finding a good site can be difficult too and of course it is very discouraging to dig down, even breaking through rock, only to find there is no water. We have been looking at ways to do more effective surveys, but these can be expensive.

I will be visiting each of the three dioceses: Mara, Rorya and Tarime. Mara is well established and has an experienced team working in development. Tarime is a new diocese but has some very good staff working for them. Rorya has much poorer infrastructure and probably needs different support.

I fly into Nairobi, Kenya, then plan to hire a 4x4 and drive with Susie over the border into Tanzania. This is always an interesting trip; hot, dusty with lots to see. We will meet with the development team and people from the communities in each of the dioceses. In some places it is not suitable to dig a well and so the project is to harvest rain water from roofs. This does not provide as good a solution as a well, but is better than just going to a river or unprotected well. Susie will plan to teach about her women's health project and see if it can be launched in our link dioceses. In Rorya diocese, I will visit our link parish, Sakawa. I will also visit Rose and her husband, Samuel, who is now principal of the local Bible College. Rose visited us here in Stanley some years ago. Please pray for safe travel.


Christian Aid Coffee Afternoon

All in the month of May....

- <u>300 years ago</u>, 4th May 1715, French merchant Jean Montagu introduced the first practical folding umbrella (it could fit in a pocket).
- <u>175 years ago</u>, 1st May 1840, the world's first adhesive postage stamp, the Penny Black, was issued in Britain (see page 17).
- <u>100 years ago</u>, 7th May 1915, a German U-boat sank the British passenger liner Lusitania. Over 1000 passengers were killed.
- <u>75 years ago</u>, 27th May 1940, the Dunkirk Evacuation took place. Nearly 340,000 soldiers were rescued in a hastily assembled fleet of 800 boats and were evacuated across the channel from Dunkirk.
- <u>70 years ago</u>, 8th May 1945, VE Day. The Allies accepted Germany's surrender and the war in Europe was over (see page 14).
- 30 years ago, 29th May 1985, the Heysel Stadium disaster in Brussels: 39 football fans were crushed to death during rioting at the European Cup Final between Liverpool and Juventus.
- <u>25 years ago</u>, 16th May 1990, to calm fears over BSE ('mad cow' disease) Agriculture Minister John Gummer tried to get his daughter to eat a beef-burger on TV. She refused, so he ate it himself.
- Also 15 years ago, 12th May 2000, the Tate Modern art gallery opened in London.

Grandparents make family life possible

Nearly a quarter of parents in the UK admit that they can only work because their children are looked after by their grandparents. And nearly four in 10 children aged between 6 and 16 say that they now are spending more time with their grandparents than with their mums and dads. One in six grandparents even has grandchildren living with them, on at least a part-time basis.

In a survey by Interflora, it was also found that just over half of all the children had shared a secret with their grandparents that they had not told their parents. Nearly half of all grandparents said they felt they needed to help, because nursery and child-care costs are seen as unaffordable.

VE Day 1945: 'Everyone burst out singing'

May 8th 1945 was VE Day: 'Victory in Europe'. The war was not entirely over, because the third member of the Axis, Japan, was as yet undefeated and still

occupied large areas of Asia. But for the people of Britain it felt like the end of five years of war: bombing, conscription, rationing, military and civilian casualties and constant anxiety.

To most people's surprise, the Second World War had lasted longer than the first one, and though the casualties were not as horrendous, they would be multiplied before a year was out by the victims of the atomic bomb attacks on Nagasaki and Hiroshima.

But on 8th May, 70 years ago this month, everyone was singing. Hitler had committed suicide in his bunker in Berlin on 30th April. The formal acts of surrender by Germany were signed in Rheims on 7th May, and in Berlin on 8th May, and the latter date was declared a day of national rejoicing. Huge crowds gathered in city centres, church bells rang and there were many services of thanksgiving.

As a schoolboy, aged 14 at the time, I shared in the general feeling of relief, though we all knew that recovery, socially and economically, would be slow. Rationing of many foods (including sweets and chocolates) continued into the 1950s, and the damage caused by bombing would leave scars in many towns and cities that took more than a decade to heal.

Yet, on that May morning, nothing was going to stop the celebrations. If relief was the primary emotion, there was also more than a hint of satisfaction. We had won the war. The Nazi menace had been seen off. Hitler and his accomplices, who had organised the slaughter of millions of Jews and other 'deviants' in concentration camps, were dead or under arrest. The deadly menace of the V2 rockets, silent carriers of instant destruction, was a thing of the (recent) past.

Mr Churchill had set out a pathway to a better future. 'Magnanimity in victory' would mean that Germany would not be humiliated. She would be helped to rebuild as a free and democratic society, but only after an absolute and unconditional surrender. There

would be no negotiating, no possible argument about the outcome of those terrible years of war. Europe was now at peace, and would remain so for a long while.

Siegfried Sassoon captured the same moment 27 years earlier, at the end of the Great War, in a poem of ecstatic relief:

Everyone suddenly burst out singing...

The song was wordless; the singing will never be done.

Neither the ecstasy nor the song can actually last for ever, but the memory of the moment remains with us older folk who were there on that remarkable May day, 70 years ago.

Two Rows by the Sea

The martyrdom of 21 Egyptian Coptic Christian young men in Libya on 15th February 2015, at the hands of IS fighters shocked the world. The Bible Society of Egypt subsequently sent out a Newsletter which included a very poignant poem, 'Two Rows by the Sea':

Two rows of men walked the shore of the sea,
On a day when the world's tears would run free,
One a row of assassins, who thought they did right,
The other of innocents, true sons of the light,
One holding knives in hands held high.
The other with hands empty, defenceless and tied,
One row of slits to conceal glaring-dead eyes,
The other with living eyes raised to the skies,
One row stood steady, pall-bearers of death,
The other knelt ready, welcoming heaven's breath,
One row spewed wretched, contemptible threats,
The other spread God-given peace and rest.

A Question ...
Who fears the other?
The row in orange, watching paradise open?
Or the row in black, with minds evil and broken?

While tracking down the bomber Carlin gets an idea in his head: could they use the device to actually travel back in time and not only prevent the bombing but also the murder of a local woman whose truck was used in the atrocity? The Way I See It: celebrating the Penny Black

I wrote three letters yesterday. That is such an unusual event that I thought I'd catalogue it. I printed them off my computer, and then looked for an envelope. I couldn't find one. Then I looked for stamps in the drawer where I used to keep them. Again, I could not find them. Undaunted, I put on my coat and walked up to the

Post Office, where I queued to buy envelopes and stamps.

Initially, thinking I ought to stock up, I asked for forty first class and forty second class stamps. But when the clerk told me the cost, I revised my order downwards, not wanting to embark on a second mortgage! Eventually, I posted my letters, and sometime over the next couple of days my correspondents, who do not have email, will get a letter through their door. Job done!

1st May is the 175th anniversary of the Penny Black, Britain's first official postage stamp. Ever since, we have been writing letters, putting them in envelopes, addressing them and sticking a stamp on. In recent years we have been spared the need to lick them, as peel-off stamps have become the fashion. The penny, of course, has multiplied sixty fold, like the biblical wheat, and, oddly, on the whole, letters take longer to arrive now than they did in the days of Queen Victoria.

What we are seeing now looks like the slow death of letter writing, which old 'uns like me are supposed deeply to regret. To be fair, I do regret not receiving personal letters (I could do without all the others: mostly appeals, advertisements or official notifications). But I can't expect to get them if I don't send them, and almost all my personal 'correspondence' is now via email. Sadly, I don't think people will one day be reading the collected emails of David Winter, or even of distinguished artists, poets or bishops. Letters will go the way of diaries and fountain pens.

Perhaps it's just as well that the invention of the internet is so recent. I can't imagine that St Paul's Email to the Ephesians would have stood the test of time.

Party leaders reveal their favourite churches

Ahead of this month's General Election, the National Churches Trust asked each of the seven main party leaders to reveal their favourite churches.

The Rt Hon David Cameron, Leader of the Conservative Party, chose All Saints Church in Spelsbury, Oxfordshire and St Mary the Virgin Church in Witney, Oxfordshire. He said: "All Saints at Spelsbury (is) where my family sometimes worship when we are at home in Oxfordshire. It has a very special memory of my late son, Ivan's, christening. Another church I have great affection for in my constituency is St Mary the Virgin in Witney. I have the honour of being one of the Patrons for the Appeal for Restoration and Renewal."

The Rt Hon Ed Miliband, Leader of the Labour Party, chose St Mary Magdelene Church in Campsall, Doncaster. "St Mary Magdalene is said to be the church were Robin Hood and Maid Marian were married. As strong believers in redistribution, the people of Doncaster North are happy to reclaim his roots. I am proud to have this church in my constituency."

The Rt Hon Nick Clegg, Leader of the Liberal Democrats, chose St Nicholas' Church, High Bradfield, South Yorkshire. "This stunning 15th century Grade One listed church is situated within High Bradfield in my Sheffield Hallam constituency... it can be

seen for miles around and offers great views across the valleys."

The Rt Hon Nicola Sturgeon MSP, Leader of the Scottish National Party, chose Fisherton Parish Church, Dunure, South Ayrshire. "I was christened in Fisherton Church in Dunure. It is a picturesque and peaceful place, with nearby castle, harbour and lookout tower. It's a place I loved as a child and still means a great deal to my family."

Leanne Wood AM, Leader of Plaid Cymru, chose Soar Ffrwdamos in Penygraig, Rhondda. "Soar is a vital part of the community as it facilitates all kinds of groups, from all backgrounds and from all sectors of Rhondda society."

Nigel Farage MEP, Leader of the UK Independence Party, chose St Thomas à Becket Church, Fairfield, Romney Marsh, Kent. "A uniquely situated church in the middle of the marsh. Quite enchanting."

Natalie Bennett, Leader of the Green Party of England and Wales, chose St Bartholomew the Great, West Smithfield, London. "Laying a hand on the walls dating back to Henry I, I reflect back on the many tumultuous events they've witnessed, and survived, from the Great Fire to the Blitz."

Since 1953, the National Churches Trust has provided £85 million worth of funding, at today's prices, to help pay for urgent repairs and the installation of up to date facilities to places of worship of all the major Christian denominations. A spokesperson said: "Whatever the result of the 2015 General Election, we hope that politicians of all parties will continue to support the task of keeping churches, chapels and meeting houses looking beautiful and able to cope with the demands of the 21st century."

How to find happiness



- <u>Class 1</u> is reading the Winnie the Witch books and will be using this as a basis for their own stories and poems. In history they will be looking at sea voyages, and in geography they will be learning about the weather and seasons, and about the equator and poles.
- <u>Class 2</u> will be talking about the VE Day 70th anniversary celebrations, and is also learning about the Great Plague. In science, they will be looking at plants.
- <u>Class 3</u> is learning about healthy living. They have had a visit from a parent who is a nurse, and have talked about which foods are healthy. In art, they are looking at the work of Michelangelo, and have also been talking about different places of worship.
- <u>Class 4</u> have the interesting topic of 'the world's mysteries' and will looking at legends such as the Loch Ness monster, and the abominable snowman. They will write their own story and newspaper report. They are also looking at sculpture, and will design their own.
- <u>Class 5</u> is looking at things that are 'Unexplained' and will also be studying newspaper reports. In art they will look at the work of surrealist painter Joan Miro.
- <u>Class 6</u> is learning about the lives of people living in Britain from the Stone Age to the Iron Age. They will also learn about ancient settlements, textiles and art work that was made, and how the geography of the British Isles has changed since then.
