

**Family History Group:** Family history sessions take place in the library on Saturday mornings from 10am-12pm.


**Coffee Morning:** There is a coffee morning every Thursday morning, 10am-12 noon. Come and relax with friends over a cuppa.



Some of the tinned and packet food that was donated will be used by the church and the café; the rest of it has been given to the St Catherine's food bank.



### The way I see it—The Fifth of November



Until fairly recent years 5th November in England was well known for foggy evenings as bonfires were lit all over the country. On many of them a 'guy' would be burnt – usually a couple of old pillows and some cast-off clothes in the rough shape of a man.

The 'guy' was, historically speaking, Guy Fawkes, one of the chief conspirators in a plot by Roman Catholic zealots to blow up the Palace of Westminster at the State Opening of Parliament on 5th November 1606, thus removing James I from the throne. Fawkes was arrested as he stood guard over a massive collection of gunpowder in an undercroft beneath the House of Lords. Under torture he revealed

the names of the other conspirators, and they were hanged, drawn and quartered on 31st January 1607, though Fawkes jumped from the scaffold and broke his neck, thus avoiding the actual execution.

The previous sixty years had seen unprecedented religious strife in England, following the breakaway of the Church of England from Rome under Henry VIII. Hundreds of priests loyal to Rome were



There is still plenty of religious strife in the world, as we all know, though little now between different groups of Christians. The 5th November might be a good day on which to pray to the one and only God that the world might see an end to the blasphemy of any killing in His Name.

**David Suchet** the actor, has recorded the whole NIV Bible for use by people with sight loss, for the charity Torch International. In preparation for doing the recording, he said that he "had to study each book as to when it was written, who may have written it, what was its purpose, who were they writing for, and putting it into its context before recording one word of each book. So I gave myself a complete Bible course as well as recording it."

If you would like to pay your own personal tribute to the soldiers who died during the First World War, consider participating in a very easy project being run by the British Legion. It will also yield big results for your garden next year!

### **'Paddington'** (2015) PG rating

Adapted from Michael Bond's beloved books, 'Paddington' follows the comic misadventures of a polite young Peruvian bear (voiced by Ben Whishaw) with a passion for all things British, who travels to London in search of a home. Finding himself lost and alone at Paddington Station, he begins to realise that city life is not all he had imagined – until he meets the kind Brown family (Hugh Bonneville, Sally Hawkins, Julie Walters), who offer him a temporary haven. But then this rarest of bears catches the eye of a sinister, seductive taxidermist (Nicole Kidman), and it isn't long before his home – and very existence – is under threat. ### **Stanley Grove School**

At the end of last half-term the school council organised an 'Orange Day' in aid of their chosen charity, Myeloma, a bone marrow cancer charity. Everyone was asked to come to school wearing something orange, and make a donation to the charity. There was also a raffle, and a bun sale. This was an extremely successful event which raised over £400—thank you to everyone for your generosity.

This term, our SEAL (Social and Emotional Aspects of Learning) topic will be 'getting on and falling out' and will incorporate an antibullying week. The children will be working at age-appropriate levels to recognise the differences between bullying and falling out, and how to deal with these issues.

Years 4 have been working towards their level 1 bikeability training, and this month, classes 5 and 6 will have a number of sessions to work towards their level 2 award. This bikeability training helps them to be safe while riding a bike. Later in the term, our Year 3 children will be having some pedestrian training sessions which includes practise in crossing the road.

The whole school is very excited to be having a visit from a local astrophysicist who will demonstrate a mobile planetarium and share their knowledge about space. As part of our space topic, all children in the school are being encouraged to build their own rocket.

We are continuing with our class assemblies. Each class take it in turn during the term to deliver an assembly to the rest of the school. It is an excellent opportunity for parents to see what their children have been working on. For example, the children might show their art work, read a bit of a story they've written, sing a song, or show some photos.

This term, the classes will be working on class enterprise projects to make something to sell at our Christmas fair which will be on Wednesday 9th December from 3.30pm-5pm. They will also be making Christmas cards and decorations.

crafts displayed was incredible—there are some very talented people in


### Smile lines.....

### Assisted Dying Bill overwhelmingly rejected by MPs

The Church of England recently welcomed a vote by MPs to reject a move to legalise assisted suicide. The Assisted Dying Bill was defeated in the House of Commons with MPs voting nearly three to one (330 to 118) not to give the proposed legislation a second reading.

The Bill would have permitted assisted suicide for terminally ill patients with six months or less to live. James Newcome, Bishop of Carlisle, said the vote sent a strong signal that the right approach to supporting terminally ill people is to offer compassion and support through better palliative care.



"We are heartened that MPs have decided not to change the law on assisted suicide," he said. "We believe that the proposals contained in the Assisted Dying Bill would have exposed already vulnerable people to increased risk. The vote sends a strong signal that the right approach towards supporting the terminally ill is to offer compassion and support through better palliative care. We believe that all of us need to redouble our efforts on that front."

The defeat of the Bill came after the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, warned that a change in the law to permit assisted suicide would cross a 'legal and ethical Rubicon' and would place thousands of vulnerable people at risk. More than 20 faith leaders including those from the Catholic and Jewish faiths signed an open letter to MPs opposing the Bill.

### The changing age of motherhood

Have you ever wondered the age at which most UK women have babies? The average age of having a first baby in 2015 is 30, but it has not always been so high. Immediately after the Second World War, the average age was 28, doubtless because many couples delayed parenthood till more secure times prevailed.

In the 1960s and 1970s the average age dropped to 26. In fact, over two-fifths of all babies born in those years were to those aged 24 or under. The "swinging sixties" culture gave England the highest teenager pregnancy rate in Europe. Less than a fifth of babies born now, in 2015, are to those under 25.




### **Prayer at Remembrance Time**
