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The Minister writes: This is the first magazine of 2016, so I would like to begin by wishing you a Happy New Year.

This is the season of Epiphany when we think again about Christmas, but through the eyes of the 'Magi', mysterious visitors from the East. Epiphany can mean "revealing of Christ to the nations", and these visitors are a powerful symbol of that. Matthew's gospel gives us a brief crafted account that tradition has built upon. Matthew does not tell us how many there were or what gender or which was their country of origin or even their status.

Art through the ages has developed the scene to depict three men; sometimes all from Persia, sometimes including an African, sometimes giving a range of ages from young to old. We even have given them names and the status of royalty. The range shown is very inclusive. That Matthew includes the story shows how important he thought it was to record the visit of people from another land with another language and a different faith. This gives a powerful picture of the Christ who draws ALL people to him.

But it is a picture with a dark side too. The outward journey was long and arduous and led them into the dangerous company of Herod.

The Magi have a moment of calm and serenity when following the star again they come upon the Christ child. They bow their knees offering their gifts and return home transformed; using a route to avoid the power hungry Herod.

Their encounter with Herod was to bring disastrous results as out of his fear of another king, Herod massacres the boys in Bethlehem. Matthew tells us how warned by an angel, Joseph leads Mary and Jesus to safety in Egypt.

What a contemporary story this sounds; families fleeing to safety as refugees in fear of their lives because of the unbelievable cruelty of people to each other. In the midst of the horror there are signs of hope. There are groups now working to bring relief and help to those in need.

These visitors from the East remind us that Christ does draw all people to himself, even us. We are challenged to be open and welcoming ourselves.

Thank you for your generosity

During 2015, the church and community groups meeting at the church helped support a number of charitable causes; your kindness and generosity in helping us do this is much appreciated. In addition, the PCC of St Peter's church made a commitment some time ago to put aside some money every year to be used for charitable causes. These are some of the donations that have been made during 2015, with the support of the congregation and community:

- The Stanley Community Singers held a wonderful and very well attended Christmas Concert on 13th December 2015 and raised £300 for the Salvation Army for their work with the homeless and needy, and also £50 each for the Move Ahead charity which supports people with brain injuries in Wakefield, and Jessie's Fund which provides music therapy for disabled children in York.
- The congregation of St Peter's took part in the annual 'Share a Christmas Card' scheme and raised £90 for Wakefield Hospice.
- The St Nicholas Day Service on 6th December 2015 was very well supported by the uniformed organisations and the congregation; hundreds of wrapped Christmas presents were donated to Barnados to distribute amongst children and young people in the UK.
- The Christingle Services were held on 10th January to celebrate Jesus as Light of the World. The services raised £143.26 in aid of the Children's Society which supports children in the UK who are not so fortunate. Thanks also to everyone who worked hard beforehand to prepare the oranges.
- Earlier in the year, St Peter's Church donated £315 to Water for Life for their on-going rain-water harvesting project in Tanzania.
- A total of £668 was sent to support Christian Aid and Tearfund's work in helping those affected by the <u>earthquake in Nepal</u> which happened in April 2015 and killed over 8,000 people.
- The church is also sending £100 each month to the <u>Cross Project</u>, which runs lunch clubs, religious education lessons and after-school activities in local secondary schools.
- The church continues to support the annual <u>Macmillan Cancer</u> Support coffee morning appeal and last year raised £280.

The British custom of afternoon tea dates back to the mid-19th century and the seventh Duchess of Bedford, Anna Russell. The Duchess complained of a 'sinking feeling' at about 4pm every day, and as it was still four hours until dinner (at 8pm), she began to have sandwiches or a small cake with some tea. Her friends thought this was marvellous; the idea spread through (hungry) upper class circles, and soon a great British tradition was born.



Women's World Day of Prayer

Friday 4th March, 7:30pm, Outwood Parish Church



"Receive children. Receive me."

Women's World Day of Prayer is a international, inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the voices of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. Every year, a great wave of prayer rises with the sun over the island of Samoa and sweeps across Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas, coming to rest in American Samoa some 36 hours later. By then, the WWDP service will have been celebrated in over 170 countries.

This year, the service has been prepared by the women of Cuba and is entitled—'Receive children. Receive me".

Cuba is an island nation; the largest in the Caribbean with an area similar to the UK; but with a population of just 11 million. The earliest inhabitants were native Arawaks from Venezuela and Guyana, but from 1492 the Spanish took charge, bringing in slaves from Africa. Cuba broke free from its Spanish rulers in 1898 and became a republic, but in 1950 a dictatorship took power which devastated Cuban society. This was swept aside in 1959 by a new communist movement, led by Fidel Castro and Ché Guevara. A trade embargo was imposed by the USA in 1961, and is still in place today, although diplomatic relations between Cuba and the USA have now been re-established.

Cuban women play an important role in society, family and the church. More than 46% of public sector employees are women, 39% of managers are women, and 68% of the technically and professionally qualified labour force are women. Nevertheless, is it is still primarily men who occupy key positions in economy, politics and religion.

After the communist revolution, the Cuban government restricted the practise of all religions. However, from 1990, religious freedom has been allowed and churches have again flourished. The largest Christian denomination is Catholic reflecting the Spanish heritage.

All are welcome—men and women, and people of all ages—to this year's local WWDP service, which will be held at Outwood Parish Church at 7:30pm on Friday 4th March.

Ash Wednesday and Lent

Lent is the period of 40 days (not including Sundays) which starts on Ash Wednesday and ends with Easter Sunday. It is traditionally a time of fasting and reflection. The name 'Ash' Wednesday is to do with getting things right between us and God and the tradition goes back to the Old Testament.

In the Old Testament, the Israelites sought repentance for their sins and mourned for the damage and evil they had done. They would cover their head with ashes, or even rend their clothes, as an outward sign of their heart-felt repentance and acknowledgement of sin. The early Christian church adopted the custom of sprinkling ashes on those who were turning to God and repenting for their sins. They started to do this at the beginning of Lent, and so Ash Wednesday became known as either the 'beginning of the fast' or 'the day of the ashes'.

The actual custom of 'ashing' was abolished at the Reformation, though the old name for the day remained. Today, throughout the Church of England, receiving the mark of ashes on one's forehead is optional. Certainly the mark of ashes on the forehead reminds people of their mortality: "Remember that you are dust and to dust you will return." (Genesis 3:19). Sometimes, as at St Peter's, a branch used on Palm Sunday the year before is burned to create the ashes for the Ash Wednesday service.

The Ash Wednesday service at St Peter's will take place on Wednesday 10th February at 7.30pm; all are welcome.

So Ash Wednesday and the period of Lent is a good time for us to consider our thoughts and actions, and admit when we have made mistakes. Have you done something which haunts you? Which makes you feel restless and defensive, every time you think of it? Why not deal with it this month, and put it behind you? Whatever your mistake, consider what the Bible has to say to you:

- 'I have not come to call the virtuous but sinners to repentance' (said Jesus). (Luke 5.32)
- 'Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon

him; and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon. (Isaiah 55.7)

• 'Yet even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the Lord, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing.' (Joel 2:12-13)

God is inviting you to come to him this Lent. What a wonderful offer! Make the most of it, and remember how the prodigal son was welcomed back by his compassionate father.

During Lent this year, St Peter's is organising some small groups to meet each week to follow a 5-week programme titled 'Preparing the Way' about the life and work of John the Baptist. The weekly meetings will be an opportunity to meet with other people and discuss the Bible in an informal and thought-provoking way. The Lent groups will start during the week commencing 15th February and will take place on the following days:

- Tuesdays, 2pm at St Peter's Church
- Tuesday, 7.30pm, location to be advised
- Thursdays, 7.30pm at the Vicarage

Further meetings might be arranged to meet demand; if you would like to take part but can't make any of these times then get in touch and suggest a time suitable for you. 

Leeds Diocesan Synod news

At the last Leeds Diocesan Synod meeting on 17th October 2015 the Synod voted to give formal support for the practise of blood and organ donation. As a result, the Synod has written to every church in the diocese of West Yorkshire and the Dales asking them to discuss the matter in their PCC meetings.

The letter has been duly discussed by St Peter's PCC, and the PCC has agreed to endorse the following points of the Synod's letter:

"That every church in the Leeds Diocese should encourage their members to consider as part of their Christian giving:

- a) becoming a blood donor; and
- b) registering as an organ donor upon their death and making their wishes known to their family."

Churches are also being encouraged to offer their premises as a centre for blood donation, although unfortunately this isn't practical for St Peter's as the hall isn't big enough, and there are several other venues already in use in the immediate area which are more suitable.

The Synod also commented on the current refugee crisis and has requested that every church in the diocese consider:

- a) how they might support refugees locally;
- b) how they might join in the debate about refugee support in the UK; and
- c) how the Leeds diocese might respond in conjunction with local authorities and charities."

The school has had a busy and exciting start to the New Year. Recently, a group of children took part in the Young Voices concert at Sheffield arena with 7,000 other school children from the area. The children spent several months learning all the songs and actions and came together in a hugely exciting concert featuring Laura Wright, the RFU anthem singer, amongst other performers. It was a wonderful evening, and children were thrilled to take part in it.

The whole school is using the outdoors as a learning area more and more. The school is taking part in the Wakefield Council and Shanks Waste Management Rubbish Monster Competition 2016 with the aim of raising awareness of the 3 R's of waste management: reduce, reuse and recycle. Each class will be designing a monster to make out of litter, and will be cooking marshmallows around our outdoor fire-pit. During the year, the school will continue to use outdoor learning e.g. looking after the school environment; den making.

Class 5 recently enjoyed a visit to Sandal castle to learn about the local area. Next month, Class 5 will be going on a 3-day residential trip to Hawkshead activity centre in the Lake District. They will be taking part in lots of outdoor activities and team games.

The Christmas concerts, fair and raffle were hugely successful, raising a total of £1,117. Half of this was raised by the enterprise projects undertaking by each of the classes; they made various items to sell including Christmas decorations, wrapping paper, gift boxes and marshmallow snowmen. Each class will be able to decide amongst themselves how to spend the money they raised.

The school is very proud of its position in the latest league tables which shows that Stanley Grove continues to be one of the top performing schools in Wakefield. This is an outstanding achievement and shows how well the children are reaching targets for their age groups and above. It also demonstrates that the school is able to challenge the more able children while ensuring all children are involved in a wide variety of topics and experiences. A huge well-done to all the pupils, staff and governors for their continued hard work which makes results like this possible.

Remembering Galileo



Galileo Galilei found himself at the centre of controversy 400 years ago this month, when he was ordered by the Catholic Church on 26th February 1616 to abandon his opinion that the Earth and planets revolve around the sun. He was banned from holding the opinion, promoting it, or teaching it.

Although highly respected as a scientist, the church feared that Galileo's proclamations cast doubt by implication on the authority of Scripture. Galileo himself argued for a non-literal interpretation of Holy Scripture to solve the "problem".

Born in 1564, he studied medicine before becoming Professor of Mathematics at Pisa in 1589, and then at Padua in 1592. In 1609, he heard about the invention of the telescope in Holland. Without having seen one, he built a superior version and made many astronomical discoveries, including mountains and valleys on the surface of the moon, sunspots, the four largest moons of the planet Jupiter and the phases of the planet Venus.

In 1632, he was again condemned for heresy after his book "Dialogue Concerning the Two Chief World Systems was published". He was sentenced to life imprisonment; later reduced to permanent house arrest at his villa in Arcetri. He was also forced to publicly withdraw his support for Copernican theory. He died in 1642. In 1758, the Church lifted the ban on most works supporting Copernican theory, and by 1835 dropped its opposition to heliocentrism altogether.

The priest smiled and answered, 'You're in Yorkshire now, son. It's a local call.'

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
During a church service my young niece had to go outside, as she did not feel well. She returned a few minutes later and admitted: 'I have been a little sick. But it doesn't matter, there's a box at the door marked 'for the sick'.

Leap Year: 29th February

2016 brings us a Leap Year. We need to add this extra day every four years in order to keep our calendar in alignment with the Earth's revolutions around the Sun. The problem is very simple: our calendar has 365 days, but it actually takes 365.242199 days (a tropical year) to circle once around the Sun. That means we are 'out' by nearly six hours a year. Four times six hours is 24 hours - hence an extra day every four years.

Adding the extra day in February goes back to Julius Caesar in 45 BC. In his Julian Calendar, February was the last month of the year, and 24th February was Leap Year Day.

An old Irish legend tells how it was St Brigid who first struck a deal with St Patrick to allow women to propose to men every four years. The arrangement was meant to 'balance' the traditional roles of men and women in a similar way to how Leap Day balances our calendar.



Attacks on Kenya Christians on the increase

Release International has charted a 'worrying' increase in attacks against Christians in Kenya, as Al-Shabaab militants seek to infiltrate the country. So says Paul Robinson of Release International, which supports persecuted Christians around the world.

A recent fact-finding visit by Release recorded increasing attacks against churches by Islamist gunmen based in Somalia, who are affiliated to al-Qaeda. There are also disturbing signs of hard-line intolerance towards Muslims who change their religion.

Now Release has also called for prayer for Hassan Ali, a recent convert to Christianity, who has had to leave his home for fear of being murdered by his relatives. According to Hassan, his in-laws were among a group of men armed with knives who came to his door in Witu, Lamu County, demanding to see him. He escaped through a window when he heard the visitors questioning his wife about her faith. His wife and their children, aged seven and four, have been taken back to live with her relatives. Her parents are reportedly insisting the children attend a madrassa (Islamic school). Hassan was raised as a Muslim but became a Christian about ten months ago.


Attacks against churches in this Christian majority country are increasing. In the last few months Islamist extremists set fire to two church buildings in Tiribe near Mombasa. Pastor Mutuku of Faith Victory Church says his congregation now meet in a tent. Pastor Nyawa, whose Holistic Church was also burned, says his remaining members are now forced to meet outside, under police protection, but are contending with heavy rains and flooding.

Release International is urging the Kenyan government to do all it can to step up security. It also says that: 'Muslim leaders must take urgent steps to counter the radicalisation of their youth.' The Kenyan government has sent troops to Somalia, where al-Shabaab is based, and has raided mosques in Kenya to counter growing radicalisation.

Last April, al-Shabaab attacked a predominately Christian college in north-east Kenya, killing 150. The terrorist group became notorious after attacking the Westgate shopping Mall in Nairobi in September 2013, killing at least 67 people.

Through its international network of missions Release International serves persecuted Christians in more than 30 countries.
