



#### The Minister writes:

It is hard to believe that we are into May, when we recently suffered from heavy frosts and snow showers. It feels rather strange after such a mild winter.

It is not only the weather that seems in chaos in the world around us. There are atrocities in Syria and ones not so well publicised in South Sudan as well as many other countries. People are fleeing for their lives into difficult and deadly situations, creating a crisis for their care. We watch in



astonishment at the build up for elections in the USA where extraordinary rhetoric gains people's support.

In our own nation it is difficult to find out the actual implications of staying in or leaving Europe. Our own government freed of the restraint of coalition partners and maybe an effective opposition is exercising a rather bullying power, imposing a contract on junior doctors and a policy for all schools to become academies. The implications could be doctors leaving their jobs so there is a dangerous shortage. Already junior doctor posts are over subscribed in Scotland (that still has the old contract) and posts in London are under subscribed for the first time ever. School head teachers are considering strike action.

Sometimes it can feel overwhelming and leave us feeling helpless. At the time of Jesus, when their nation was occupied by a Roman army and people of power were acting in appalling ways, Jesus came with a message of hope and challenge. This has been a guide for His followers ever since, especially in times of persecution. It is a message to love, to be especially concerned for the poor and marginalised. But also to speak truth to those in power. When faced with issues that seem too big and difficult to manage, we can decide to do what we can where we are. As a former Bishop of Wakefield once said while visiting us, 'bloom where you are planted'. Small acts of love and kindness can transform situations, together these small acts can transform a nation.

## Plant and Seed swap at Stanley Library



#### **ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING—a review**

The AGM was held at 12pm on Sunday 24th April. Copies of the April 2015—March 2016 annual report are available in the church or on the church website. Highlights are given below:

**PCC Report**: Plans for the old church site including the war memorial are ongoing. Newcold have pledged to help but inclement weather has held up progress. However, the positions for the columns have been marked out and excavated. Negotiations for extending the lease on the present building are ongoing. In April 2015 the church was officially designated as a 'Parish Centre of Worship'. Heartfelt thanks to Barry McCarthy who is standing down as churchwarden after many years of faithful and dedicated service. Our links with the local community are strong and continue to develop in many ways. Thank you to everyone who supports our church financially which enables us to continue our work both here and in other parts of the world.

**Treasurer's Report**: Income for the year was £93,827; there were increases in planned giving, room hire income and café income. The coffee mornings, pantomime and galas continue to be well supported. Costs for the year were £94,176; the increase of £8,967 from last year was largely due to our investment in some lovely new chairs, and also higher energy costs. The overall financial position worsened slightly by £349. Thanks to higher regular giving, we were able to pay our Parish Share in full although the share amount for 2016 has increased again, to £46,503. We pray that we will be able to fulfil all our financial obligations as well as realising the many hopes we have for our church and community.

**Church Wardens' report**: The church continues to be a base for many community groups, which wouldn't have been possible in the old building. Rather than worrying about the state of the building, we can instead concentrate on becoming a living and active church. We still await a decision about an extension to our lease, and thank our local councillors for their ongoing support. We are actively discussing locating a miners' wheel on the old church site. We thank all those many individuals who contribute so much to the life of the church: to Bill and his team of spiritual leaders, and to everyone else who contributes.

**Young People**: The Explorers/Sunday Gang meets most Sunday mornings during the church services for crafts, games and Bible study.

All children are made to feel welcome, whether regular attendees or just visiting. Children's Ark meets on Thursday mornings from 9:30am for parents and tots, and includes singing, Bible stories, crafts and playtime. Many thanks to the leaders of these groups for their enthusiasm and dedication.

**Uniformed Organisations**: St Peter's continues to support the 1st Yorkshire Baden Powell Cubs and Scouts that meet on Tuesdays at the church, and the 39th Wakefield Brownies and the 3rd Cardigan Rainbows that both meet on Mondays next door at the Cross Keys centre.

Ladies Society: The Ladies Society enjoyed various speakers during the year and outings to Otley town centre, and Rogerthorpe Manor for Christmas lunch. New members are very welcome; meetings are on the 4th Wednesday of the month at 7pm at Stanley library.

**Other groups**: The 'Knit and Natter' group continues to grow and has over 20 members. The ladies do a variety of crafts and learn some new ones too, and have also contributed to the various church fairs. The Stanley Community Singers also continues to be well attended and held two very successful charity concerts during the year. The Film Club serves a wide community and shows an eclectic mix of films for all ages from modern to classic.


**Social Events**: Our pantomime, 'Snow White' was very successful and we sold about 600 tickets. Thank you to everyone who works so hard to organise the monthly coffee mornings, and the other fundraising events during the year. We also held a wine tasting night, murder mystery evening, Harvest and Christmas community lunches, Harvest ceilidh, and numerous charity events.

**Vicar's report**: I am very grateful for the team that supports the ministry of the church: assistant minister, pastoral ministers, readers, baptism co-ordinator, church wardens and many others. We have held regular Taize and Holy Space services, and continue to be very involved with St Peter's school. Thank you to those who continue to make improvements to the building, and to the staff and volunteers who keep the café going. We held a John the Baptist lent course and are currently working through the Jesus Shaped People 15 week course. If we continue to work together, seeking the Lord's guidance and using the gifts he has given us, we have a challenging and exciting future ahead of us.

## EU Referendum – which way should Christians vote?


There is no 'correct Christian view' on how to vote in the EU referendum which is taking place in the UK on Thursday 23rd June, so says the Archbishop of Canterbury. He also says that people are entitled to fear the impact that "enormous" numbers of migrants will have on our jobs, housing and the NHS.

Speaking in a recent interview with The House magazine, Justin Welby said it was "outrageous" to condemn people who raise concerns as "racist". Instead, their "genuine fears" needed to be addressed.



"Fear is a valid emotion at a time of such colossal crisis. This is one of the greatest movements of people in human history. Just enormous. And to be anxious about that is very reasonable."

His comments are taken by many as the most significant concerns raised by the Church of England in the present migrant crisis. The archbishop went on to repeat his call for Britain to take more than 20,000 refugees.



#### **BBC Breakfast host who honours the Sabbath**

The new host of BBC Breakfast, Dan Walker, is to be given Sundays off because as a dedicated Christian he refuses to work on the Sabbath. Dan Walker, 38, was a sports presenter before replacing Bill Turnbull. He is the son of a Baptist preacher, and has reportedly built his career around his religious beliefs. On first becoming a television presenter, fronting sports events and hosting Football Focus on BBC One, Dan struck a deal that meant he did not work on Sundays. "I was convinced that it was the right thing to honour God... Observing the Lord's Day is a great privilege and brings with it loads of blessings."

BBC Breakfast has an average daily audience of six million viewers. Dan Walker will continue presenting Football Focus.

#### Jihadist attacks on Christians

The jihadist attacks on Christians and other religious minorities across the Middle East are now so serious that they should be officially classified as genocide. This is the view of a number of Britain's top legal authorities.

And so a cross-party group of peers has recently written to David Cameron, urging him to use the UK's position on the UN Security Council to begin the process of bringing war crimes prosecutions against Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (Isil) terrorists. Led by Lord Alton, the group includes Lord Mackay, a former lord chancellor, Lord Carlisle, a former reviewer of government terrorism legislation, and Baroness Butler-Sloss, a former president of the High Court Family Division.



#### **Beware the 'Trump culture'**

Twitter risks turning the world into a place where people abuse each other quicker than they can think. So says the new bishop of Dorking, the Rev Dr Jo Bailey Wells. "There is a sort of, you might call it, a Trump culture. I've certainly experienced that in America. I would be keen to keep it from these shores. But part of our culture is that we now tweet and blog before we speak and think. Cyberspace, the blogosphere, has encouraged that kind of behaviour."
