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The Minister writes:

Hope is Born

I was in London last week and was rather overwhelmed by the number of people. I went to catch a morning tube and the platform was completely full of commuters so the whole station was packed from the edge of the platform to the tube walls. As each tube train came in a number of the crowd got on, we all moved forward and waited till the next train came. I had to wait for about 4 trains before I was able to get on. Then I saw an article about the world's biggest traffic in USA, when so many people were traveling for their Thanksgiving that the roads were gridlocked.

I was struck by the outrageous fact that Jesus came for everyone of these people, and for me too, too many for us to imagine. Each person with their own hopes, dreams, fears and disappointments. This Christmas season is when we can once again reflect on the amazing story of God coming to dwell amongst us to bring Hope. Coming into a world he had created to be a good place but we human beings have messed up. God did not abandon us to our fate but in the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus has given us a way for a fulfilled future. This is God's gift of hope to a world in desperate need of love, forgiveness and a better way of living.








What is Christingle all about?

The word Christingle means the Christ-light, and the tradition of Christingle goes back to 1747, when the pastor of a church in Germany, John de Watteville, wanted to help his congregation understand about God's love for the world. He came up with the Christingle, which became popular within Germany before spreading to other countries. Nowadays, the Christingle is an orange with a red ribbon around it. Mounted in the orange are four cocktail sticks, each carrying some sweets. The orange represents the world, and the sweets remind us of all the wonderful gifts that God has given us in our beautiful World: He gave us these gifts because He loves us.

On top of the Christingle there is a candle which stands for Jesus: God sent Jesus into the world to light our way back to God. Finally, the red ribbon stands for the blood of Christ. He came into the world for a purpose: to die in order to take the pain and the sin of the world upon himself. This means that when we do something wrong and feel bad about it, we can go to God and know that we are forgiven.

Today, collections taken at Christingle services are given to the Children's Society to help its mission to change the lives of vulnerable children across the country who have no one to turn to. Whether they are a young carer, a refugee or at risk of sexual exploitation, there are

thousands of children in the UK who need someone who is willing to listen to and support them.

By taking part in a Christingle service this season, you can help to change the lives of disadvantaged children and families in our local communities.

The Challenges of Christmas by Rev Paul Hardingham

Christmas is a great time of year, but it's not without its challenges! One household had 250,000 Christmas lights, but could not boil a kettle for fear of blowing the system!

<u>The challenge of over-indulging</u>: We all remember the episode of the Vicar of Dibley, where she had to consume four Christmas dinners! Christmas is a time when we usually eat and drink far too much, the average person gaining 6 pounds in weight. But Christmas is not simply about gaining weight, but losing what weighs us down. 'Cast all your anxiety on Him because He cares for you.' (1 Peter 5:7). Whatever your concerns or worries this Christmas, bring them to God.

<u>The challenge of overspending</u>: In the rush to buy Christmas cards, a woman bought a pack of 50 identical cards. Without reading the verse, she hastily signed and sent them off, but for one. A few days later she read the message: 'This card is just to say a little gift is on the way.' Christmas is not about getting into debt, but God getting us out of debt. He spent exactly what was needed on the first Christmas night: 'You are to give Him the name Jesus, because He will save His people from their sins.' (Matthew 1:21).

The challenge of over too quickly: Christmas doesn't last very long, yet the effect of the first Christmas is long-lasting. 'For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life.' (John 3:16). Jesus has come to bring us life in all its fullness, now and for eternity.

How do we face the challenges of Christmas? - 'Yet what I can, I give Him - give my heart'.

Christmas all wrapped up!

"And this will be a sign to you, you will find the babe, wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger." Luke 2:2

Do you dread wrapping all those Christmas presents? The roll of flimsy paper that slides around the table; the lumpy gifts that defy wrapping, the tape that sticks to your fingers...what's so important about wrapping presents, anyway? Why not just hand them over? Well did you ever consider that the very first Christmas present EVER was

wrapped up – in swaddling cloths? In biblical times, after a birth, the umbilical cord would be cut, the baby would be washed, rubbed with salt and oil, and then carefully wrapped in swaddling cloths. The swaddling is described as a cloth or blanket tied together like bandages. This process was carried out with great love and care, and was thought to have health-giving benefits.

On the other hand, to ignore the swaddling process was seen as abandonment and rejection. "And as for thy nativity, on the day thou wast born thy navel was not cut, neither wast thou washed in water to soothe thee. Thou wast not salted at all, nor swaddled at all. (Ezekiel 16:4 KJ21)

So why wrap your presents? Because just as the baby Jesus was swaddled as a sign of great love and care, wrapping our gifts is a sign of our own effort, love and care towards those whom we love. So be patient with the wrapping paper, and Happy Christmas!

The school children have already had great fun decorating the Christmas tree in the hall and putting up decorations they have made. Parents were invited to come in and help with this. Sir George—the man who gave his name to Mount Everest

The man who had the highest mountain in the world named after him died 150 years ago, on 1 December 1866. Sir George Everest, who was born in 1790 in Wales but baptised in Greenwich, spent much of his life exploring and surveying India.

Eventually he became Surveyor-General there, and his diligence, accuracy and innovative skill were much admired. His successor, Andrew Waugh, honoured the "master of geographical research" by naming the world's highest peak after him when he could find no local name.

In fact the mountain is called Chomolungma (Mother Goddess of the Earth) in Tibet, and the Nepalese call it Sagarmatha (Goddess of the sky). Before Waugh, the British called it Peak XV.

There is some doubt as to whether Sir George ever actually saw the mountain that bears his name, but his triangulation network was extended by Waugh and used to locate the summit.

Sir George retired in 1843 and returned to live in England, where he became a Fellow of the Royal Society. He was knighted in 1861, and in 1862 he was elected Vice-President of the Royal Geographical Society. At the age of 56, he married 23-year-old Emma Wing, who bore him six children.

He died in Paddington but was buried in Hove. Two of his brothers were ministers. Curiously, although the mountain is universally pronounced Ever-rest, Sir George pronounced his own name Eve-rest, with Eve as in Adam.

That coin in your Christmas pudding

There is a tradition, which dates from the Middle Ages, of putting silver coins into Christmas puddings. The first coins used were a silver farthing or penny.

After World War One, it became a threepenny bit and then a sixpence. Finding one was supposed to bring you good fortune, but you were probably more likely to break a tooth as you bit into the pudding! Other coins 'appear' at this time of year; chocolate coins are traditionally sixty at the sixty of the sixty and in Lawrich traditional decimals.

Other coins 'appear' at this time of year; chocolate coins are traditionally given to children at Christmas time, and in Jewish tradition during Hanukkah. It is said that one night St Nicholas climbed on a roof and threw a purse of money down a chimney, which landed in a pair of stockings that a little girl had hung up to dry. Good throw!

Trafalgar Square's very special Christmas Tree

This year, as every year for the past 69, a magnificent Norwegian spruce will stand in Trafalgar Square. It is seen as a symbol of freedom and a token of friendship.

This huge—it is generally more than 20 metres tall—annual gift from the people of Norway has been sent every year since 1947. It is Norway's way of thanking Britain for standing by them during the dark days of the Second World War. For when the Nazis invaded Norway in 1940, King Haakon VII fled to the UK. The British then enabled him to set up a Norwegian government in exile in London, where he could send radio messages back to his occupied homeland.

The tree is known to Norwegian foresters as 'the queen of the forest', and each year only the very best is chosen to grace Trafalgar Square. The trees can be hand-picked years in advance. Many of them are very old, which means they were quietly growing deep in a Norwegian forest during the dark days of Nazi occupation and death.



Many years ago, another tree in another occupied land played a crucial role when a Gift to the whole world was put on display. He was not lit up for a holiday season, but instead became the Light of the world. This month we remember His birthday, and look ahead to His amazing gift to us of forgiveness and friendship with God – through His death on a tree. Jesus is the reason for Christmas, and He is for life, not just for Christmas.

1936 – the year the King stepped down

Eighty years ago – on 11th December 1936 – King Edward VIII became the only sovereign to ever abdicate voluntarily in this country. He did so in order to marry an American socialite divorcee, Wallis Simpson, one of a number of women with whom he had had affairs.

Edward – known to everyone in his family as David – had been King for 11 months. On his abdication he took the title of Duke of Windsor and went to live a high society life, mainly in France.

Edward was born on 23rd June 1894 in Surrey. He joined the Grenadier Guards in World War One, but was not allowed to see active service. In the 1920s he represented his father, George V, on many foreign tours and this, together with his visits



to deprived areas of the UK, plus his charm and good looks, brought him considerable popularity.

But there was a rift between him and the Archbishop of Canterbury, Cosmo Gordon Lang, because of his apparent lack of interest in the Church, of which he was head. There have been suggestions that it was this rift that made the abdication unavoidable.

The Archbishop and many of the King's advisers were in any case against marriage to a divorcee, and all attempts to find a solution failed. Edward's brother became George VI and led Britain through the Second World War, while the Duke became Governor of the Bahamas. He died of throat cancer in Paris in 1972.



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
