



### The Minister writes:

This is the first magazine of 2017, so I would like to begin with wishing you all a Happy New Year.

We are at the beginning of the year, but already significant things have happened for the life of the Parish. The vacancies at Outwood and Wrenthorpe have given the opportunity to start a new way of working collaboratively across the parishes.

After prayer and consultation, this has resulted in me being licenced as Priest in charge of Outwood and Wrenthorpe. At the same time, two young Priests have been licenced into each Parish. Jonathan Bish into Outwood and Jo Kershaw into Wrenthorpe. They are a married couple so will be living in the Wrenthorpe vicarage.

We are in the process of thinking and praying how this will work out. I want to encourage a good relationship between the parishes. It is all too easy to live in next door parishes and yet know very little about what goes on there or the people who live and worship there.

Each parish has it's own distinctive style and the plan is for that distinctiveness to be retained but for us to grow in understanding and valuing the differences. The Church of England has a rich tradition of diversity and we have an opportunity to experience something of that in our own communities.

I would like to encourage people to come along to events in each parish, so we are inviting people from Outwood and Wrenthorpe to come to our Ceilidh on 11th March at St Peter's school. There is a Youth Event at Wakefield Cathedral in the evening of 24th February and I am hoping that young people from each parish will come to that. Wrenthorpe are having a 'Sing-along to Frozen', with optional fancy dress, on 11th February

We are planning to use the same material for our Lent groups in each parish, and to encourage some mixing from the congregations.

There are some important things to agree and decide e.g. what do we call the new grouping? I look forward to a year developing this new relationship; may God bless it.

### Thank you for your generosity

During 2016, the church and community groups meeting at the church helped support a number of charitable causes; your kindness and generosity in helping us do this is much appreciated. These are some of the donations that have been made during 2016, with the support of the congregation and community:

- St Peter's church continues to support <u>Water for Life</u> projects in the Mara region of northern Tanzania. A total of £1,126.50 was sent during the year, including some donations collected by St Peter's school in aid of Mara.
- The church has given a total of £1,700 during the year to <u>The Cross</u> <u>Project</u>, which runs lunch clubs, religious education lessons and after-school activities in local secondary schools.
- £500 was sent to <u>Tearfund</u> to help with their disaster relief work in Haiti following the devastating effects of Hurricane Matthew; and a further £183 was given to Tearfund for their <u>Toilet Twinning</u> <u>Scheme</u>. This money will have helped build toilets in some of the poorest areas of the world.
- £300 was given to <u>Mytholmroyd PCC</u> after the Boxing Day floods in 2015, and £300 was given to the local <u>Asylum Seekers</u> team which supports refugees and asylum seekers in our area.
- The Stanley Community Singers held a wonderful Christmas Concert on 4th December 2016 and raised £350. From this, the singing group made a generous donation to the <u>Broadhead Family</u> and this was augmented by a further donation from the church.
- The St Nicholas Day Service on 4th December 2016 was very well supported by the uniformed organisations and the congregation; hundreds of wrapped Christmas presents were <u>donated to Barnados</u> to distribute amongst children and young people in the UK.
- The Christingle Service was held on 8th January and raised £128.97 in aid of the <u>Children's Society</u> which supports children in the UK who are in need. Thanks to everyone who worked hard beforehand to prepare the oranges.



• Lastly, the church continues to support the annual <u>Macmillan</u> <u>Cancer Support</u> coffee morning appeal and last year raised £140; and the poppy appeal raised £130.36 for the Royal British Legion.

However, because the church's monthly coffee morning takes place during library opening times we are able to continue with it, for the time being at least.



Women's World Day of Prayer is a international, inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the voices of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. Every year, a great wave of prayer rises with the sun over the island of Samoa and sweeps across Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas, coming to rest in American Samoa some 36 hours later. By then, the WWDP service will have been celebrated in over 170 countries.

This year, the service has been prepared by the women of Philippines and is entitled—'Am I being unfair to you".

The Philippines comprises over 7,000 islands located on the Pacific 'ring of fire' close to the equator. This contributes to the high incidence of earthquakes and typhoons each year; Typhoon Yolanda in November 2013 claimed thousands of lives. Climate change is also resulting in an increase in storms and droughts.

17% of elected government posts are filled by women and there have been two female presidents. The Philippines has one of the fastest growing Asian economies; primary exports are coconut oil, fruits, garments and products for the electronics industry. Many women are the breadwinner for the family, often working abroad as service crew, in the medical field, or as domestic helpers. In fact, 90% of domestic workers are women; a considerable number working in Gulf countries. Although the constitution provides for equal rights, Filipino women are often discriminated against and treated as subordinates in the home, in the church and in society.

The service written by the women of the Philippines is on the theme of justice and the exploitation of women; a highly relevant subject in today's world; there must scarcely be a country where some form of exploitation of women doesn't occur.

All are welcome—men and women, and people of all ages—to this year's local WWDP service, which will be held at Stanley Methodist Church on Mount Road, Stanley, at 7:30pm on Friday 3rd March.

### 'Can you find it in your heart to forgive me?'

'Can you find it in your heart to forgive me?' Sometime it is possible to say yes, but there are times when the pain and hurt goes too deep. Sometimes it's gone on for years and we find it impossible to forgive. This is especially so if it has affected not just ourselves but those we love.

Last summer I came across a book in church. It is called 'Total Forgiveness', written by R.T Rendel, who for many years served at Westminster Chapel. The introduction starts with a quote: 'You must totally forgive them. Until you forgive them you will be in chains. Release them and you will be released.'

How? I still have bad dreams and memories that leave me all churned up inside and bitter, which is not good for soul or health. The author tells us we have two choices: continuing this way, or forgiving and being at peace with ourselves and God. One way he managed this was by meditating on how God made this person in his own image and loves him (or her), more than we are capable of loving anyone; how

God grieved over his sins and wants him to repent for the pain he has caused and come back to him.

I've found this helps but I have to do it on a daily basis or the memories take over again. I also



look for other passages in the Bible for help, such as 1 Corinthians 13: 4—13 which includes the 'Love keeps no record of wrongs'.

I look back at the all the wasted years and regret them. Due to circumstances I had no way of avoiding them. The author too had this problem although his circumstances were very different from mine, and he quotes a passage from the Old Testament, Joel 2v25: "I will repay you for the years the locusts have eaten."

If trying to forgive our enemies - not always enemies – sometimes people closer to us – is hard, forgiving ourselves is even harder. If we feel guilty we haven't forgiven ourselves, and can't function as we should, we are hanging on to guilt that God has washed away. We are refusing to believe what God has freely done.


But 1 John 1v9 is true: not forgiving ourselves and being angry with ourselves is self-hate. Jesus says don't be: 'Don't be angry with yourselves, take your forgiveness and don't look back.'

Most of what I've written is taken from 'Total Forgiveness'. I think it is a book everyone should read. Although it makes me realise how hard it is, it also makes it possible. Looking at the state the world is in today, we all need to understand and love one another more, and a lot of forgiveness is needed.

Dr Ken Hart of Leeds University ran the 'World's First Forgiveness Course'. Designed to help people forgive their enemies and let go of grudges, it was not as far as I know a Christian course. But maybe it is a sign that there are, as R.T Rendel says, indications that the world is beginning to recognise the merits of forgiving people.


Meanwhile, I shall keep trying. After all, when I look back at what I've asked God's forgiveness for and compare it to what I need to forgive, it shouldn't be impossible.



Immediately following the end of Mums and Tots, at 11.15am, the library continues to have a <u>Tiny Tots story time in the library</u>, every Monday for under 5's.

Don't forget there are other parent and child groups in Stanley every week: <u>Busy Bees is on Tuesdays at Zion Church on Aberford</u> Road in Stanley from 9.15am-11.15am and there is <u>Children's Ark on</u> <u>Thursdays at St Peter's Church</u> in Stanley at the same time. Both these groups are also open to all adult carers and children aged 0-5 and also offer a variety of play, crafts, story time and refreshments. Come along to any of these groups and you and your child can both make new friends and enjoy a bit of fun and socialising.



### Ash Wednesday and Lent

Lent is the period of 40 days (not including Sundays) which starts on Ash Wednesday and ends with Easter Sunday. It is traditionally a time of fasting and reflection. The name 'Ash' Wednesday is to do with getting things right between us and God and the tradition goes back to the Old Testament.

In the Old Testament, the Israelites would cover their head with ashes, or even rend their clothes, as a sign of their repentance and acknowledgement of sin. The early Christian church adopted the custom of sprinkling ashes and started to do this at the beginning of Lent. And so Ash Wednesday became known as either the 'beginning of the fast' or 'the day of the ashes'.

The custom of 'ashing' was abolished at the Reformation, though the old name for the day remained. Today, throughout the Church of England, receiving the mark of ashes on one's forehead is optional. Sometimes, as at St Peter's, a branch used on Palm Sunday the year before is burned to create the ashes for the Ash Wednesday service.

The Ash Wednesday service at St Peter's will take place on <u>Wednesday 1st March at 7.30pm</u>; all welcome.



Ash Wednesday and the period of Lent is a good time for us to consider our thoughts and actions, and admit when we have made mistakes. Why not deal with these mistakes this month and put it all behind you. God is inviting you to come to him

month and put it all behind you. God is inviting you to come to him this Lent. What a wonderful offer! Make the most of it, and remember how the prodigal son was welcomed back by his compassionate father.

St Peter's will be organising some small groups to meet each week during Lent to follow a 5 week programme of Bible study. These weekly meetings will be an opportunity to meet with other people and discuss the Bible in an informal and thought-provoking way. The Lent groups will start during the <u>week commencing 6th March</u>.

### A Priceless Find – by accident!

70 years ago this month, on 7th February 1947, a shepherd looking for a lost sheep at Khirbat Qumran (now in the West Bank, Palestine) near the Dead Sea, stumbled across a cave containing the most important biblical discovery of the century.



Inside the cave, stored in clay vessels, were found what became known as the Dead Sea Scrolls: manuscripts of the entire Hebrew Bible except for the book of Esther. The scrolls were the work of a religious community called the Essenes, who lived near that site before and during the life of Jesus.

Despite now being known as the greatest archaeological find of the 20th century, there was an initial lack of interest. Some of the scrolls were even advertised in a small ad in an American newspaper.

More scrolls were then found in neighbouring caves, and as scholars slowly unravelled them, they discovered that they were handling manuscripts of the Bible which were hundreds of years older than any others in existence. Most of the manuscripts on which our Bible translations had previously been based were copies of copies, carefully crafted in monasteries over the centuries by people dedicated to preserving the sacred text. Surprisingly, these much older Dead Sea manuscripts were almost identical, indicating the great care taken by copyists down the ages.

Most of the scrolls were in Hebrew, but some were in Aramaic, the language spoken by many Jews, including Jesus, between the sixth century BC and the siege of Jerusalem in



70 AD. One of the most intriguing manuscripts from Qumran is the Copper Scroll, a sort of ancient treasure map that lists 64 hidden treasures around Israel. However, none of these have been uncovered.

So, in February 1947, thanks to the searching of a shepherd, the world suddenly had access to a much older and therefore more accurate record of the Jewish Scriptures – the Bible of Jesus and the first Christians. Today, we now have a Bible text which is as close to the original as one could ever hope to get.

The first multi-faith homeless shelter started in Leicester late last year. More than 200 volunteers from six different faith groups took part in the One Roof Leicester initiative, which involved moving around different faith venues over 11 weeks, as it provides food and emergency accommodation for ten rough sleepers each night.



The shelter brings together Anglican, Catholic, Jewish, Hindu, Muslim and Sikh groups across the area. The project is funded by the charities Human Appeal and Housing Justice and Near Neighbours, administered by Church Urban Fund.

### Sir Cliff's faith 'even stronger' after ordeal

Sir Cliff Richard has said that after nearly two years facing false sexual assault allegations, his faith in God has become 'even stronger'.

Sir Cliff was speaking in a recent interview with Steve Allen on LBC. He said that learning to forgive his accuser was for him the turning point that helped him release 'all that hate and anger'. And the support of friends who believed in him and stood by him



was of critical help.

During the two year ordeal, "I found I was talking to God a lot more, praying. I felt the need to forgive this person, who I am sure I have never met, because I found myself being filled with hate. I wanted to get revenge, and I thought, 'I

don't think I'm going to survive this if that's the way I'm going to feel.' So by forgiving him... it released me of all that hate and vengeance. Forgiving is not a simple thing to do, but when I look back, my God, that was the best simple thing I have ever done."

The singer said he felt he has become a 'stronger person', and even now, at 76, has no plans to retire. Instead he plans to downsize his career and make it 'more compact'.

the UK's second most popular sandwich filling. Fish fingers are seen as a healthy source of protein, after the warnings against processed meat such as bacon.


