

The Minister writes:

We approach Easter this year with the sadness of having lost one of our most faithful members of the congregation, Don Somerville.

Don was born in Paddington, London, and brought up there. As a child in the war he was evacuated to Crowcombe, a little village in Somerset, which he remembered as a happy time. He was a good rugby player who played for Wasps in their B team; though he did damage his knee. He continued to follow rugby, especially the 6 Nations and the World Cup.

As an adventurous young man he travelled to Ceylon—Sri Lanka as it is now—to work as a manager on a tea plantation. It was there that he acquired the taste of drinking his tea black, a habit he continued throughout his life

After returning from Sri Lanka he went on holiday to visit his sister in Newport. It happened that Nan worked with his sister and they needed an extra girl to make up numbers. With a decision that would change her life forever, Nan chose to give up her original plans and join the party. Nan was involved with guides and Don was into scouts. They never stopped talking, Don stayed the full 2 weeks, and they ended up spending the rest of his life together. They set up home in London where Don worked making jigsaws. Then Waddington's bought out the company he worked for and he was asked to move North, where he was a factory foreman.

As newcomers in the village they thought coming to church would be a good way of getting to know people. They soon got involved. John Crabb, the vicar at time, could see a good man and in 1971 asked Don to carry the cross. He has done so faithfully ever since for the last 46 years. He helped Laurie set up the scouts. His service to the church has been amazing. Mostly in the background; not making a fuss. He was efficient ,thoughtful and very supportive. We are still discovering all the background jobs he did, getting the church ready for services.

He will be greatly missed and the church will never be the same without him.. We give him into God's love with our Easter hope of resurrection and new life.

Easter faith: Three years after the Russian Revolution of 1917, a great anti-God rally was arranged in Kiev. The powerful orator Bukharin was sent from Moscow, and for an hour he demolished the Christian faith with argument, abuse and ridicule. At the end there was silence.

Then a man rose to speak. He was a priest of the Russian Orthodox Church. He went and stood next to Bukharin. Facing the people, he raised his arms and spoke just three triumphant words: 'Christ is risen!'

At once the entire assembly rose to their feet and gave the joyful response, "He is risen indeed!" It was a devastating moment for an atheist politician, who had no answer to give to this ancient Easter liturgy. He had not realised he was simply too late: how can you convince people who have already experienced God, that He does not exist?

Remembering Corrie ten Boom

Corrie ten Boom, the Dutch Christian writer and speaker, was born 125 years ago this month, on 15th April 1892. She died on the same date in 1983. According to Jewish custom, celebrating the same date for both birth and death is the sign of a special individual, and this was certainly true of Corrie ten Boom, who helped many




Jews escape the Holocaust during World War Two, and then established a rehabilitation shelter for concentration camp survivors.

The story of 'The Hiding Place' set up in the ten Boom family house to hide Jewish refugees and others is well documented. When an informant tipped off the Nazis, the entire family was imprisoned, and Corrie and her sister were sent to Ravensbrück Concentration Camp. She was released, through a 'clerical error', just days after her sister had died there. A week later all the women in her age group were sent to gas chambers.

Corrie ten Boom told the whole story in her best-selling book, The Hiding Place (1971), which was made into a film in 1975. In 1977, she emigrated to California.

Wilbur & Orville Wright – the first men to control flight

Wilbur Wright, the American aviation pioneer, was born 150 years ago this month, on 16th April 1867. Together with his brother Orville, he achieved the first powered, sustained and controlled plane flight on 14 December 1903.

They could have made the flight the previous day, when conditions were good, but declined because it was a Sunday. Their interest in flying had originally been sparked when their father, a bishop in the Church of the United Brethren in Christ, brought home a toy 'helicopter', based on a French invention, for his two younger sons. They played with it until it broke, and then built their own.

Wilbur, who was perhaps the driving force of the two, never married because "he did not have time for a wife and an airplane". He died early, in 1912, worn out by business exertions, mainly surrounding patent controversies.

The Wright brothers, who started out as bicycle builders, were among several people in different countries trying to invent aeroplanes. Their first flight took place near Kitty Hawk, North Carolina.



Their fundamental breakthrough was the invention of a unique method of control which enabled the pilot to steer the aircraft effectively and to maintain its balance. This method remains standard on fixedwing aircraft of all kinds and justifies the Wright brothers' claim to have made powered flight possible.

Good soup—When did you last buy a tin of canned soup? If you can't remember, you are not alone – it seems that these days we prefer chilled fresh soup in cartons, or even making it ourselves by blitzing together fresh ingredients straight from our fridge.

Research by The Grocer magazine concluded that, with a drop in sales of £28.7 million just last year alone, 'canned soup is on a sinking ship.'

23rd April: St George and Hiccup and the dragon

Have you seen the film 'How to Train your Dragon?' It's set in a Viking village under attack from dragons, who steal livestock and burn down houses. Hiccup, the village Chief's son, invents a machine to

capture dragons. However, when he catches one of the most dangerous dragons, he cannot kill it, because he sees that the dragon is just as frightened as he is. Through this friendship, the people and dragons eventually live in harmony.



This month we celebrate St George, the patron saint of England. He is famous for slaying a dragon, a legend which became popular in the Middle Ages. Whether he killed an actual dragon is debateable! However, we do know that the original George was a Roman soldier at the time of Emperor Diocletian. He refused to renounce his faith, as commanded by the Emperor, resulting in his death on 23 April 303AD.

The contrast is clear: St George slayed the evil dragon, while Hiccup refused to kill one. However, they also have something important in common. Both acted according to their conscience, defying the popular understanding of those around them and not worrying about the personal cost to themselves. St George was martyred for standing up for his faith in Jesus before a pagan emperor, while Hiccup risked rejection by his father and village because of his compassion.

Today, we are still called to stand for Christ against wrongs and injustice in a daily life, whatever the personal cost. However, we also need to be ready to look our enemies in the eye and meet their hostility with love and compassion. This is why we also remember this month that Jesus died and rose again, so that we might have God's power to do this in our lives.

Memorial Service: Sunday 30th April, 4pm





April 1st: All Fools' Day

In years gone by, the rules surrounding April Fool were this: between midnight and noon on 1st April, everyone is 'fair game' to be made a fool of. It is the morning of the practical joke. But the aim is not just to discomfort the victim: he must be tricked into taking action himself, sent on a 'fool's errand'.

And so children would be sent to the dairy for a pint of dove's milk, or to the bookseller for The Life of Eve's Mother. Practical jokes on a bigger scale were played: in 1860 a vast number of people received an official looking invitation to the Tower of London that read: 'Admit the Bearer and Friends to view the Annual Ceremony of Washing the White Lions.' Precisely the same trick had been played in 1698.

Then, on the stroke of noon, tradition decrees, April Fools is finished. If anyone attempts devilry thereafter, even while the clock is still striking, it recoils on his own head. A child would then race through the sing-song formula: 'April-Fool-Day's-past-and-goneyou're-the-fool-and-I-am-none!'
