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The Minister writes:

Thank you to everyone who worked so hard to make our Summer Gala such a success, and thank you to all who came to support us. It is really encouraging to see the community coming together and to catch up with friends and neighbours.

People keep telling me how time goes quicker as one gets older. This year seems to be disappearing at an astonishing pace. It is already a year since the country voted to leave Europe, but the future is even less clear than it was then. We have had another election that has confounded the pollsters. There have been a number of disturbing terror attacks in our country as well as a tragic fire. The follow up investigations to the fire at Grenfell are showing that many more buildings have unsafe cladding. In fact to date, not one tower block tested has had cladding that meets the required government standard. If we look around the world we see even more difficult and disturbing events.

Sometimes the bible is criticised for all the stories of suffering. Actually it only seems to reflect the world as it is, a place where many people find life difficult.

How can faith help us? First of all it is to note that there has never been the promise of an easy life. In fact Jesus talks about the opposite, taking up our cross to follow him. But he is with us to help and guide. As I wrote last month after the Manchester bomb; "As is often the case some hope comes out of the senseless violence. People of all faiths and none came out to stand together, to support each other and say that 'love wins'. The only effective solution to hatred is love. After the fire at Grenfell fire our bishop Nick wrote "it comes after a weekend of remarkable events that demonstrate the unity of diverse communities. Not only the deeply compassionate response of ordinary people to the plight of those caught up in the Grenfell Tower fire, but also the Great Get Together. Thousands of people have got together in local communities not just to remember and honour Jo Cox, the MP killed a year ago here in West Yorkshire, but to demonstrate that difference does not necessarily mean division." Let us work to build our relationships grow together in love and respect our differences.

The annual church summer gala was held on Saturday 24th June and was a very well attended and successful event raising £1,808.42 for church funds which was a similar fantastic amount to last year.




There was a incredible team of people there from early in the morning to help set up all the gazebos and stalls, and again at the end of the day to clear everything away and tidy up.

The story behind the hymn: "Eternal Father Strong to Save"

Eternal Father, strong to save, Whose arm hath bound the restless wave, Who bidd'st the mighty ocean deep Its own appointed limits keep; Oh, hear us when we cry to Thee, For those in peril on the sea!



The author of these words, William Whiting, was an Anglican clergyman in Winchester, which is hardly a seaside town. Yet Whiting had not only grown up by the sea, but had nearly died in it. As a young man, he was once on ship which was caught in a violent storm. He felt certain that it was God who saved the ship from sinking that night.

Some years later, as headmaster of the Winchester College Choristers' School, Whiting was approached by a student in distress. The student was due to sail to the USA, and was simply terrified at the thought of 3000 miles of ocean. To try and reassure them, Whiting shared his experience by writing this poem, basing the description of the power and fury of the sea on Psalm 107.

It is not known if the poem helped the nervous student or not, but within a year it had become a hymn, and sailed into the influential first edition of Hymns Ancient and Modern of 1861.

Another Anglican clergyman, John B Dykes, wrote the music. He was already a successful composer, with 300 hymns to his name. Dykes named this tune 'Melita', after an old name for Malta, where St Paul was once shipwrecked.

The hymn soon became a favourite with the Royal Navy and the United States Navy. Other Services adapted it, including the Royal Marines, the Royal Air Force, the British Army, and the United States Coast Guard. Above all, it became known as the Royal Navy Hymn.

It was also the favourite hymn of President Franklin Roosevelt, who was Secretary of the Navy during WW2. In 1963 'Eternal Father' was played by the Navy Band as President John F. Kennedy's body was carried up the steps of the U.S Capitol to lie in state (Kennedy had been a PT boat commander in WW2). More recently, 'Eternal Father' made an appearance in the Hollywood blockbuster 'Titanic', and is often chosen by ship's chaplains for use in civilian services at sea.

Five-year-old Saroo gets lost on a train travelling away from his home and family. Frightened and bewildered, he ends up thousands of miles away in chaotic Kolkata. He is adopted by an Australian couple, and finds love and security as he grows up in Hobart. Not wanting to hurt his adoptive parents feelings, he suppresses his past and his hope of ever finding his lost mother and brother. But a chance meeting with some fellow Indians reawakens his buried yearning. With just a small store of memories and his unwavering determination, Saroo embarks on one of the greatest needle-in-a-haystack quests of modern times. Based on a true story and starring Dev Patel and Nicole Kidman this is a breath-taking, beautiful and totally engrossing film.

Meryl Streep stars as Laura Reimuller, whose son Robbie begins suffering from epileptic fits. As the fits worsen, doctors test various dangerous drugs on Robbie, who becomes disruptive and mentally retarded. Laura conducts her own research, and discovers a special diet which may cure her son. She has to take on the medical establishment and battle for Robbie's right to try out the miracle cure. There are some excellent performances—not least from Seth Adkins who plays Robbie—in this thought-provoking film which raises questions about the inadequacies and dangers of some medical treatments.

Jane Austin – 200 years since her death

Jane Austen, a brilliant, quintessentially English novelist much loved for her irony, social realism and criticism of the upper classes, died 200 years ago this month, on 18th July 1817. She was almost unknown in her lifetime, having published books like Pride and Prejudice, Sense and Sensibility and Mansfield Park anonymously.

She was also a Christian (and the daughter of a rector) but did not wear her heart on her sleeve. A reticent Anglican, she wrote early on that she "did not like the Evangelicals" but later felt that those who were Evangelicals "from reason and feeling must be happiest and safest". Her novel Mansfield Park tackles a theme dear to the heart of many late 18th century Evangelicals—the abolition of the slave trade.



Throughout her writing her main characters are transformed by love, an idea of course central to Christianity. Her faith may not call attention to itself in her novels, but it is everywhere in her work. One critic wrote: "The stories are subversive and work like Jesus' parables. The humour and the ironic insight into human sin get under your skin."

An image of Jane Austen will appear on the new polymer £10 note, to be released in September.

The less you move, the more you age

Older people who spend most of their time sitting down age significantly quicker than those who are more active.

To add some detail to that: if you sit for 10 hours or more a day, and do less that 40 minutes of moderate physical activity, then you will end up with a body of a person eight years older than your real age. You may have shortened telomeres, the tiny caps found on the ends of strands of DNA which protect chromosomes and which are associated with faster ageing.

Experts from Age UK are therefore urging older people to make sure that they stand up and walk around every 20 minutes, if at all possible.

Government advice recommends 150 minutes of moderate aerobic exercise a week for older people.

UK Active urges: "With health and social care budgets stretched to the limit, it's time to end our love affair with the chair, and get people moving again. It's never too late to get active, and simple things at home, such as carrying the groceries, climbing more stairs and pottering around the garden can play a huge role in staying healthy and independent. Keeping active is the surest way to look after our physical, mental and social health, adding life to our years and years to our life."

How far do you live from where you were born?

Where were you born? And how far away is that place from where you now live? The average distance seems to be up to about 100 miles. If that does not seem far, consider this: only 25 years ago

most British people tended to live within five miles from where they had been born.

Recent research by the genealogical website Ancestry has found that exactly half of us still live in the place where we were born, and half of us move on. 70 per cent of people who move away from their birthplace are sure that they will not return, and just 14 per cent ever plan to go back.

New Lambeth library

Lambeth Palace is to build a nine-story tower in order to house the biggest collection of religious works outside the Vatican. The new library will stand at the far perimeter of the grounds.

Lambeth Palace has been the official London residence of the Archbishop of Canterbury for nearly 800 years and stands on the south bank of the River Thames, 400 yards south-east of the Houses of Parliament on the opposite bank. The first library at Lambeth Palace was founded in 1610. The construction of the new one will begin next year, and will hopefully be finished in 2020. It will be the first new construction on the site for 180 years.

The existing library contains over 120,000 books as well as the archives of the Archbishops of Canterbury and other church bodies dating back to the 12th century. Highlights of the collection include a Gutenberg Bible and rare illuminated texts such as the Lambeth Bible, Lambeth Choirbook and the Mac Durnan Gospels which is an early mediaeval Irish manuscript of the four gospels.

Holy Trinity Church, Hull

England's largest parish church has recently been made a minster. Holy Trinity faced closure in 2009, but was transformed by a £4.5million development project, and the energy and commitment of



its congregation, which has tripled. The 700 year-old church was founded by Edward I, and is as old as the city. William Wilberforce, who was born in Hull in 1759 and who led the parliamentary campaign against the slave trade, was baptised in Holy Trinity church.






