

The Minister writes:

On 27th September this year the United Benefice of Outwood, Stanley and Wrenthorpe officially came into being. The Revd Dr Joanne Kershaw was licenced as assistant priest at St Anne's, Wrenthorpe and Revd. Jonathan Bish was licenced as priest in charge at St Mary Magdalene Outwood. As Incumbent of Stanley, I then became the Priest in charge of the Benefice.

This means that we have greater opportunities to work together across the parishes and we have the chance now to work out what this means in practice. So far our discussions have come up with some clear desires. We value the different styles of worship in each church and would like each one to maintain its distinctiveness especially on Sunday mornings. We are inviting people from each parish to join in with some joint services. On the third Sunday of each month there is a reflection service at Wrenthorpe starting at 6:30pm; this has been going for some time and will continue. On the first Sunday of October and each alternate month following there will be a prayer and praise service at Stanley. On the first Sunday of November and alternate months there will be a service at Outwood using music and images to help our worship. So far these have included the music of Simon and Garfunkel and Leonard Cohen. All the services will start at 6:30pm and I would like to invite you to come and see.

We also want to work together and encourage each other in other areas; working with children and young people, men's groups and many others. We would also like to share more in our social events: there has been much interest in our wine tasting evenings and Ceilidh, to say nothing of the pantomime. You will see elsewhere that tickets will be available soon. There is a rumour that Cinderella's step sisters are particularly ugly this year! We are also planning a joint confirmation service at Outwood in December; if you might be interested or know anyone who might be, please let me know.

Last month I wrote about the mystery of finding God in the midst of suffering. The natural disasters and man-made conflicts continue to shake the world in which we live. As we celebrate Harvest and the bounty that the earth provides when properly cared for, let us continue to give thanks to our loving God and be generous to our neighbours.

St Peter's Harvest Festival Service



THE WAY I SEE IT: Well, why Do the Nations?

Canon David Winter considers worldwide unrest...

"Why do the nations so furiously rage together?" we used to sing from Psalm 2. We've just had a summer of international discontent, war-like words shouted across the oceans, accompanied by bloodcurdling threats of fire and fury 'such as the world has never seen'. So the question is eternally relevant: Why do nations threaten, rage and conspire? What is it in human nature that makes people who would actually prefer to live in peace act in warlike ways? The psalm, having posed the question, offers us an answer, but it is in the

context of Israel 3000 years ago rather than the present world. The nations were conspiring against God's chosen nation, so watch out!



The truth is that fear of 'the other' usually lies behind national anger and threats. We do not trust those strange people over there, so we will conspire or rage to stop their supposed threat to us. Fear and ignorance generally lie behind international disputes, just as they often do in domestic or personal ones. Reverence for God ('fear' of him) is the psalmist's answer, and probably those who truly believe that 'our times are in his hand' will find it easier to replace fear and anger with prayer and trust.

That's not a diplomatic or political answer to a real military threat, of course. But perhaps understanding other people's fears may help us to find a solution to our own.



William Tyndale: Bible translator and martyr

William Tyndale was born 523 years ago this month, on 6th October 1494. He was born near Gloucester, studied at Oxford and Cambridge, could speak seven languages, and was proficient in ancient Hebrew and Greek. His life's passion was to translate the Bible so that English men and women could read it for themselves. His translation of the Bible was the first to be published in English, and the first to take advantage of the new printing presses.

However, it also cost him his life; his work was seen as a direct challenge to the Roman Catholic Church and he was executed in Brussels in 1535. However, just two years later, King Henry authorised the Great Bible for the Church of England, which relied largely on Tyndale's work.



'Three and Out' (2008)

Paul Callow (Mackenzie Crook) is fed up with city life and driving trains and when two people fall under his train in as many weeks, he really has had enough! Then he hears the 'three and out' rule: three fatal accidents in a month qualifies you for early retirement with 10 years salary... lump sum! Paul suddenly sees a way of clearing his debts and escaping to a better life—all he has to do is find a willing victim. Down and out Tommy Cassidy (Colm Meaney) is willing to help Paul by being his third fatality, but not before he ties up a few loose ends with his ex-wife (Imelda Staunton) and daughter (Gemma Arterton). Over the course of the weekend, relationships between all four are changed forever but when Monday morning arrives, Paul and Tommy are confronted with the harsh reality of the deal they struck. Surely they won't go through with it. Or will they?

The 500th Anniversary of the Reformation

Paul Hardingham considers why the Reformation was so important...

October 31st marks the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther nailing his 95 Theses to the Wittenberg church door in 1517, signaling the start of the Protestant Reformation. He was protesting against the practice of indulgences, where the good deeds of the saints could be purchased to reduce time spent in purgatory, before arriving in heaven.

For Luther, this cheapened grace, repentance and forgiveness: 'You can't buy God's friendship!'

Luther rediscovered the truths of God's grace: 'For in the gospel the righteousness of God is revealed – a righteousness that is by faith from first to last, just as it is written: 'The righteous will live by



faith'.' (Romans 1:17). He recognised that righteousness (being right with God) and forgiveness is not earned by good works, but faith. The undeserved love of God and his acceptance is a matter of trust. This challenge to the church of Luther's day remains so today! At the Diet (Council) of Worms, he refused to recant his views: 'Here I stand; I can do no other!'

Luther stood for the free forgiveness of the gospel, by which God accepts us because of the death of Jesus on our behalf to deal with our sin. Is this what we believe? Only trusting Jesus can make us right with God. We will continue to get things wrong, but God never gives up on us!

A heart of compassion

Seven of us were attending a musical production at a crowded amusement park. Wanting to sit together, we tried to squeeze into one row. But as we did, a woman rushed between us. My wife mentioned to her that we wanted to stay together, but the woman quickly said, "Too bad", as she and her two companions pushed on into the row.

As three of us sat one row behind the other four, my wife, Sue, noticed that the woman had an adult with her who appeared to have special needs. She had been trying to keep her little group together so she could take care of her friend. Suddenly our irritation faded. Sue said, "Imagine how tough things are for her in a crowded place like this." Yes, perhaps the woman did respond rudely. But we could respond with compassion rather than anger.

Wherever we go, we will encounter people who need compassion. Perhaps these words from the apostle Paul can help us view everyone around us in a different light—as people who need the gentle touch of grace. "As God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience" (Colossians 3:12). He also suggests that we

"bear with each other and forgive one another" (v13).

As we show compassion, we will be pointing others to the One who poured out His heart of grace and compassion on us.

Compassion is understanding the troubles of others.

Rapid response of chaplains to Hurricane Harvey


Following Hurricane Harvey a few weeks ago, 250 'rapid response' chaplains were sent by the relief organisation Samaritan's Purse to minister to the victims of the recordbreaking floods around Houston. The crisis-trained chaplains provided



emotional and spiritual care to people reeling from fear and loss at some of the hardest-hit locations.

Now Samaritan's Purse has called on Christians to continue to pray for the victims as they face a desolate autumn, for the Texas National Guard, the military, law enforcement, and local leaders who are working so hard to help in the aftermath of this crisis. It will take months, and even years, to recover from the floods.
