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The Minister writes:

As is often the case, the March magazine is published as we begin Lent. Once again we have an opportunity to use this month as a preparation for the great festival of Easter, with the powerful themes of death and resurrection; themes that we see all around us.

Death and resurrection are themes that we see in nature, partly through the changing seasons, but also through cultivation. Cutting back plants is a way of encouraging growth, as is digging out weeds and spreading fertiliser. In our spiritual life there are many ways of applying these principles. Cutting back can give us a positive reason for giving things up. Jesus was particularly good at spending time in prayer so he knew what to say 'no' to.

The digging up of weeds can also represent the cutting out of things in our lives that are not helpful; whilst sowing new plants or seeds can be a picture of something that will lead to growth.

It is helpful if we take time to discern the areas of our lives that leave us more desolate or diminished so are good things to stop. It could also lead to the whole area of confession as we face up to areas in our lives that need to change. Confession then becomes a positive experience as the fault is faced up to and dealt with by decisively turning away from it. By God's grace we are then set free from the consequences.

So maybe giving up a TV programme could be helpful if we used the time to enrich ourselves in other ways. This can take a number of forms: taking time to read the Bible and pray; deciding to spend time with neighbours or friends; perhaps joining one of our Lent Groups to build relationships and encourage faith to grow; choosing to care for someone perhaps with a phone call or writing a letter.

This year there are opportunities to join other churches in Wakefield for a service each Sunday evening during Lent. The times and places can be found on page 15 of this magazine, along with the details of our small groups. Let this Lent be a time for growth, as we ask the Holy Spirit to make us restless till we change, and prepare for the glorious celebration of Easter.

Women's World Day of Prayer

This year, the Women's World Day of Prayer service has been prepared by the women of the Philippines and is entitled 'Am I being unfair to you?". Women's World Day of Prayer is an annual event which enables us to hear the voices of women from all parts of the world. It is celebrated in over 170 countries from Pacific islands, across Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas.

The Philippines comprises over 7,000 islands. Its location on the Pacific 'ring of fire' near the equator contributes to the high number of earthquakes and typhoons each year. The Philippines has a growing economy and many women are the main breadwinner for their family, often working abroad as service crew, in the medical field, or as domestic helpers. 17% of elected government posts are filled by women and there have been two female presidents. However, Filipino women are often discriminated against and treated as subordinates in the home, in the church and in society.

The service written by the women of the Philippines is on the theme of justice and the exploitation of women; a highly relevant subject in today's world. Please join us.

How do you see yourself this Lent?

The whole of this month is Lent – bad news for chocaholics desperately waiting for Easter so that they can indulge again! But for those who take self-discipline seriously, it's a reminder that Christianity isn't a short-term option. Among the harder sayings of Jesus was this one: 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me'.

The phrase 'deny themselves' is the challenge of Lent, and the origin of the idea that for those six weeks we 'give up' something. Once upon a time it was meat; nowadays it's more often something that we know is damaging to our health or well-being. Neither option really meets the demands of 'self-denial'. Jesus was certainly not thinking of dieting or giving up luxuries. For one thing he and his followers were known to enjoy their food and drink (and were criticised for it!). They knew about fasting as a religious discipline, because at specified times it was part of their Jewish faith — a discipline, but not 'self-denial'.

For Jesus, self-denial is a mental attitude. It's not self-loathing or seeing ourselves as valueless. We are made in God's image and of infinite value to him. Jesus demonstrated true self-denial in the Garden of Gethsemane when he simply prayed 'Not my will, but yours, be done'. 'Me first', 'looking after Number One', is self-indulgence. Self-denial is its precise opposite. Oddly enough, putting God's will before our own seems to make for happiness, not misery – even in Lent.

There are of course other ways of approaching Lent. Instead of seeing it as a time to give things up, we can use the time for self-examination, reading Scripture, penitence, fasting and prayer.

We can also think of Lent as an opportunity to hold a mirror up to ourselves and ask the question, 'who am I? It is a season of honest encounter with who we are, what we've done, and the world in which we live. How will you keep the Lent period of 40 days running up to Easter? What will you see when you hold up the mirror to yourself? Alongside taking time to read Scripture, study a Christian book and pray with fasting, why not give up texting for Lent and simply talk on the phone; commit ourselves to just working 40 hours a week or spend five minutes each day in silence!

Whatever we do, Lent is a season for self-reflection, as we put ourselves in a position to receive afresh the forgiveness and healing that God offers.

Lent of course begins with Ash Wednesday. There will be an Ash Wednesday service at St Peter's on Wednesday 1st March at 7.30pm; all are welcome.

During Lent, there will be small groups meeting every week to follow a 5 week programme of Bible study entitled 'Receiving Christ'. These weekly meetings will be an opportunity to meet with other people and discuss the Bible in an informal and thought-provoking way. The Lent groups will be meeting on the following days and times and will start during the week commencing 6th March:



2017 Faith Easter Egg launched

The new look Real Easter Egg 2017 range has been launched, and churches are being asked to encourage people to support this unique way of sharing the story of Easter.

This year a 24 page Easter story-activity book, illustrated by Alida Massari, is included in the Original, Egg Hunt and Dark eggs. The Special Edition has an Easter traditions booklet inside. The Sharing box, with 30 eggs, comes with 30 colour-in posters. Out of the 80 million Easter eggs sold in this part of the world every year, The Real Easter Egg is the only one which has a copy of the Easter story in the box, is made of Fairtrade chocolate and makes a donation to charity from sales.

The Real Easter Egg was launched in 2010 but the supermarkets turned down the idea. It was left to churches and church schools to place orders to fund The Meaningful Chocolate Company so they could make The Real Easter Egg.

David Marshall, creator of the Real Easter Egg, said; "With the support of churches more than one million eggs have been sold with 750,000 of these sent through the post directly to churches and schools. The rest have been sold through independent retailers and supermarkets.

"The success of The Real Easter Egg has meant that the production of Fairtrade chocolate has moved to the UK. Over £250,000 has been raised from sales for charitable causes. Due to production restrictions, this year we have slightly few eggs available so we recommend people order as early as possible."

The whole range can be ordered online at www.realeasteregg.co.uk (with free delivery) or from Traidcraft, Eden.co.uk, TLM trading.com, Embrace the Middle East. Christian bookshops and some cathedrals also have stocks. You can also buy the blue Original egg from Tesco, Waitrose and Morrisons.

Less drink, less smoke: Today's youngsters are the least likely on record to have tried alcohol or smoked by the time they are 16. Only 16% of 8-15 year olds has tried alcohol, compared to 45% of youngsters in 2003. And only 4% have smoked by the age of 15, compared with 19% in 2003.

The man who brought us Thomas the Tank Engine

A reluctant author who created characters loved by millions of children died 20 years ago this month, on 21st March 1997, aged 85.

The Rev Wilbert V Awdry is best known as the writer of Thomas the Tank Engine and 25 other railway books,

which at the time of his death had sold an estimated 50 million copies. They have also given birth to toys, games, videos and a

television film series.

He invented the stories initially to tell his son Christopher when he was ill with measles, and had to be persuaded by his wife Margaret to get them published.

Mr Awdry, who was made an OBE shortly before his death, was a clergyman who ministered in Hampshire, Wiltshire, Birmingham and Cambridgeshire. He was also a pacifist who once lost his curacy as a result. He was always interested in railways, having been fascinated as a child in Wiltshire by listening to steam trains ascending the grade into the nearby Box Tunnel.

The Fat Controller in the stories is sometimes thought to be a God-like figure, but he was intended as a satire on bureaucracy. For Mr Awdry, the morality of the stories was clearly Christian, and analogies between the Christian faith and the ways of the railway were obvious: the engines are meant to stay on the right track, and they pay the price if they go off the rails. But they are always forgiven, and never scrapped.

Asked how he hoped to be remembered, he said he would like his epitaph to say that "he helped people see God in the ordinary things of life, and he made children laugh".

The best way to read a bedtime story: Do you want a closer tie with your children? Read them a bedtime story at night, from a book. It is much more effective that using a kindle or tablet device. A recent study by the University of Sussex discovered that children feel less of a physical and emotional connection with their parents if they are read bedtime stories from an electronic device. It may be due to the fact that children know they could be watching a film or playing a game on the same device. Or it may be that a book allows for closer physical contact during the reading of the story.

Fairtrade Fortnight, 27th February—12th March

Fairtrade Fortnight is when campaigners, businesses, schools and places of worship show their support for the farmers who grow our food in developing countries. When we reach for our favourite food and drink without thinking about where it comes from, we may be feeding exploitation. We become part of the problem.

But we can choose to be part of the solution: look for Fairtrade tea or coffee in the supermarket or in your favourite coffee shop. Whether choosing a healthy banana or a chocolate treat, your choice can make the difference. Look for the Fairtrade Mark, and if your local shop doesn't stock what you want, ask them to do so. If you enjoy baking, then there is a Fairtrade choice for everything from cocoa to sugar paste, from vanilla to icing sugar.

However hard they work to provide the things we depend on, millions of farmers in developing countries aren't paid what they deserve. It's not a new problem. But when we come together we can change the way people think about trade and the products on our shelves. Your actions can change the lives of those farmers and workers. Join thousands of others across the UK this Fairtrade Fortnight and help your friends, neighbours, colleagues and communities to put Fairtrade in their coffee break and take exploitation out.

Mothering Sunday—25th March

There is an old Jewish saying: "God could not be everywhere and therefore He made mothers." Mother Church, Mother Earth, and our own mothers have all been part of 'Mothering Sunday' which has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 1600's.

The Fourth Sunday in Lent was called 'Mid-Lent' or 'Refreshment Sunday', when the rigours of Lent were relaxed more than was normal for a feast day. People went to their 'Mother Church' (their home church or cathedral) to worship and give thanks. Apprentices, and other workers, went home for the weekend and often brought gifts (or accumulated pay) home to their family.

In most countries, Mother's Day is a secular festival celebrated on the 2nd Sunday in May. In the UK it is celebrated on the 4th Sunday of Lent, on the Christian day of Mothering Sunday. Join us at St Peter's on 26th March at 10am for our Mothering Sunday parade service.



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
