The Minister writes:

It is a very strange feeling beginning to write my last magazine letter here in Stanley. I am grateful for the many messages of encouragement about the opportunities in retirement. Time to visit family and friends and do the things that full time work makes impossible. Never the less there is also a real sense of loss too. Being a vicar is an extraordinary privilege. One has an opportunity to come alongside people and families at the most significant times in their lives. It has been wonderful to see God at work as we have prayed and struggled together over the years. I will miss the community that we have become so much part of. Thank you to all those who been part of our journey together

One of the most disturbing aspects of the world around us is the prevalence of violence; whether it is the suicide bomber or a school massacre. Even in many films and cartoons there is a theme of violence that in the end wins the day. There are 'good' guys that win and 'bad' guys that need to be destroyed. A Theologian called Walter Wink has written of the 'myth of redemptive violence', that is the idea that violence saves. So for some people the answer to school massacres is more guns in school with teachers being armed. There is the terrible image of gun fights in crowded class rooms. Wink traces this idea back to the Babylonian creation story, that tells of a violent battle between gods, that leaves some victorious and dominant. In contrast to this, Genesis tells of a creation that is made out of love and made well. In the beginning a place of Peace and beauty, though it is then messed up.

In the story of Jesus we have a stark contrast to the idea that victory comes from violence. At Easter we remember that Jesus chose to use his power not to bring violent victory, but to choose powerlessness and allowed himself to be killed. His saving act was then vindicated by his resurrection. So when Jesus challenges us to take up our cross and follow him, he is calling us away from a reliance on violence to a radical response to conflict that is non violent and that seeks to build relationships with each other rather than fight.

This is difficult but has a deep logic. Violence begets violence, and it is easy to see the danger of a never ending cycle of tit-for-tat that continues to escalate. By contrast, a response that creates a relationship of trust and a growing understanding can result in genuine peace. We can see that 'evil' is just as much part of us as our enemy. My prayer for our community and our world is that we can follow Jesus in this way of Peace.

Women's World Day of Prayer

This year, the Women's World Day of Prayer service has been prepared by the women of Suriname and is entitled 'All God's creation is very good!" Women's World Day of Prayer is an annual event which enables us to hear the voices of women from all parts of the world. It is celebrated in over 170 countries from Pacific islands, across Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas.

Suriname is a small country on the north-eastern coast of South America. It has a population of only 560,000 and 90% of the country is covered by pristine tropical rainforest. Suriname is feeling the effects of worldwide climate change through increased drought, hurricanes and flooding. Other environmental change has been caused by the polluting effects of gold mining.

Suriname is a country of extreme beauty and biodiversity with 715 species of birds, many orchids, and protected animals including the giant anteater, ocelot, jaguar, blue frog and the giant sea turtle.

In the 21st century, our 24/7 lifestyle demands good economic outcomes and excellent returns. However, as Christians we need to balance God's Creation with man's creations. We need to be guided by the theme "All God's Creation is very good!"

There isn't a local WWDP service this year. The nearest service will be at Wakefield Cathedral at 12.30pm on Friday 2nd March.

St Peter's will begin a period known as 'interregnum' which means that the church will be without a priest in charge. However, the process to appoint a new vicar will start immediately, and the PCC will shortly be preparing all the information needed to advertise the post.

This process will be done in conjunction with the other churches in our United Benefice: St Mary Magdalene in Outwood and St Anne's in Wrenthorpe, as the new vicar will take over Bill's role as Lead Vicar for the United Benefice, as well as being the priest in charge of Stanley.

It is not clear how long the process to appoint a new vicar will take, but we will continue to give you updates where appropriate in the parish magazine and on our Facebook page.

We have a huge amount to offer a new vicar at St Peter's and in Stanley: a supportive community and many exciting things going on. And the fact that we have such a warm and welcoming church to offer a new vicar is testament to the character and inspiration of Bill and Viv.

Easter Services at St Peter's church

Palm Sunday, 25th March, 10.30am

Easter is the most joyful day of the year for Christians. Christ has died for our sins. We are forgiven. Christ has risen! We are redeemed! We can look forward to an eternity in his joy! Hallelujah! Celebrate the joy with us on Easter Sunday morning at 10am.



The unexpected effect of celebrity vicars: Celebrity clergy such as Rev Richard Coles and Rev Kate Bottley have helped the Church of England appear more accessible, and thereby boosting the number of trainee clergy up to a ten-year high. Such is the belief of a number of church leaders, such as the Bishop of Repton, the Rt Rev Jan McFarlane: "With Richard and Kate being on Strictly Come Dancing and shows like that, they've just come across as human people who happen to have a strong faith." And so, while in 2016 there were 476 new trainees; last year there were 544 new trainees. New priests are also getting younger; last year 28 per cent of trainees were under 32.





Mothering Sunday—11th March

There is an old Jewish saying: "God could not be everywhere and therefore He made mothers." Mother Church, Mother Earth, and our own mothers have all been part of 'Mothering Sunday' which has been cel-

ebrated in the UK since at least the 1600's.

In most countries, Mother's Day is a secular festival celebrated on the 2nd Sunday in May. In the UK it is celebrated on the 4th Sunday of Lent, on the Christian day of Mothering Sunday. Join us at St Peter's on 11th March at 10am for our popular Mothering Sunday family parade service.

The Charge of the Light Brigade by Canon David Winter

150 years ago, this month, James Brudenell, Earl of Cardigan, died. He was the officer in charge of the Light Brigade, who 12 years earlier, following a misleading order, charged valiantly at the massed ranks of the Russian artillery in the battle of Balaclava.

Many of the men and horses were killed, and the rest were forced to withdraw. They had charged at the wrong target – they should have been retrieving some stolen guns from a small unit of Cossacks. The story was widely reported at home, but the event, and the Earl of Cardigan's role in it, would have been long forgotten had not Alfred Lord Tennyson, six weeks after the news broke, written possibly his best-known poem, 'The Charge of the Light Brigade'.

I remember, perhaps 15 years ago, my son, who was then working for the BBC Sound Archive unit, telling me of his experience while copying and technically improving a batch of very early recordings. He was given one to work on which was Tennyson himself reciting 'The Charge of the Light Brigade'. He described it as an eerie and moving experience – the poet's calm and controlled voice and the profoundly emotional words, full of both anger and admiration. It can be found on the BBC website, via 'Archive'.

Although 'the soldiers knew someone had blundered', they charged valiantly into a hail of shells, 'theirs but to do or die'. Great victories become part of history, but so do gallant defeats. Those 600 cavalrymen, immortalised by a great poet, may have lost the battle, but they won many hearts.

The Mother of Science Fiction

Science fiction is well-loved, not just in books, but also in films and on television. 'Star Wars', for instance, is almost a religion, with millions of followers. Sci-fi, as it is known, sets out to use a 'scientific possibility' as a fictional tool. It may destroy the world, or (as a scientific saviour usually demonstrates) bring in a new dawn of hope.

We assume science fiction is a modern phenomenon, but this month we are reminded otherwise. On March 11th 1818 a young writer, Mary Shelley, published her first book, 'Frankenstein', generally judged to be the earliest science fiction novel. It was the story of a scientist who, in the course of some daring experiments, found that he had created a monster, a grotesque being with some human abilities. The clever scientist Frankenstein had opened Pandora's box.

The book had arisen out of a competition between three established writers and one novice, Mary Shelley, to write a 'fantasy' novel. Shelley's Frankenstein won the competition and was published, but the author was not named. Such was its success, however, that when it was reprinted three years later, she was credited as the author. It was some time before anyone else made a similar impact with a science-fantasy novel – probably not until H G Wells and 'The Time Machine', 80 years later.

Many years after that, science fiction took DOU another brilliant—this time nonsensical—turn with Douglas Adams' science fiction comedy series 'The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy' which was first broadcast on BBC Radio 4 on 8 March 1978, 40 years ago.

Described by one commentator as 'Dr Who HITCHHIKER'S meets Monty Python", it was actually much better than that, mixing brilliant off-the-wall thinking with

hilarious characterisation and situations. The radio series eventually evolved into a five-book trilogy, a TV series and a film. Adams himself died of a heart attack in 2001 before the film appeared, but his achievements in his field have probably never quite been equalled.

GUIDE TO

The adventure opens with the destruction of Earth to make way for a hyperspace bypass, and there is plenty in it to upset Christians of a sensitive nature, reflecting as it does a universe not very close to anything depicted in the Bible, or indeed anywhere else. But although Adams described himself as a "radical atheist", it was hard to view his work as anything but brilliant nonsense.

A memorial service was held for him on 17th September 2001 at St Martin-in-the-Fields Church, Trafalgar Square, London. It was the first church service broadcast live on the web by the BBC.




