The Minister writes:

Dear Friends, it is lovely to have finally arrived and start to settle into life here in Outwood, Stanley, Wrenthorpe and Alverthorpe. First of all a big thankyou for your warm welcome to Angela and myself and for your support at my licensing service in early June. We are both thrilled and excited to be here at this stage in the life of the benefice and look forward to sharing our lives and 'getting to know people' over the coming months and years.

We have not moved far, in fact from just over the M1 after serving nearly thirteen years at St Michael's in East Ardsley. Over the years though I have moved extensively around the country for both work and church life. My roots are in Royston near Barnsley where my father was a miner until the pit closed in 1968. We then moved to south Leeds and it was from there that I went onto university where I met Angela and we married and lived in South Manchester throughout the 80s.

A call to the ministry came about in the mid 80's which took several years to come to fruition and involved us living in Poole in Dorset. It was from Poole that I went to train for the ministry in Durham in the mid 90's. Ministry then took us to Wiltshire followed by eight years in the Cambridgeshire fens before arriving in East Ardsley in 2006. During this time our twins Beth and Sam arrived on the scene.

Over the long hot Sundays of summer, our readings from Acts bring the early Church to life and how the disciples lives were transformed by the power of the Holy Spirit to go out and share the good news of Jesus across the known world. At the end of the day God's people are always a journeying people, a pilgrim people. Church of England Alexa skill is asked 75,000 questions

A year after its launch, the Church of England's award-winning Alexa skill has been asked more than 75,000 questions, according to recent data. The smart speaker skill can be used to access prayers, explanations of the Christian faith and where to find the nearest church.

The data revealed that the highest number of people use the skill in the evening. As a result, the Church's Digital and Church House Publishing team has added a wider range of mealtime, evening and night prayers. More family prayers have also been added, as well as a range of videos to bring the Christian faith to life and showcase the social action work of churches.

In a typical week, people asked Alexa to 'say a prayer' (40%), 'explore the Christian faith' (31%), 'find my local church' (7%) and 'share a grace before a meal' (6%)

The skill has been recognised at a number of leading digital industry awards and has averaged 4.2 out of five stars on the Alexa store, with comments such as "Love it - great example to the kids on how to pray". The Archbishop of York, Dr John Sentamu, said: "The aim of the Alexa skill is to help users to know more of the love of Jesus Christ, to enable regular churchgoers and those exploring faith to connect with God in another way and at a time that's right for them.'



Walking on the moon in July 1969

American astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin 'Buzz' Aldrin became the first people to walk on the surface of the Moon 50 years ago, on 21st July 1969.



There had been some dispute over who would step first on to the Moon's surface, but Apollo 11 commander Armstrong was given the privilege partly for technical reasons. Lunar module pilot Aldrin followed him almost 20 minutes later.

Both men were Christians. Aldrin, who was an elder at Webster Presbyterian Church, Texas, had got special permission to take bread and wine with him to space and take Communion privately. He did this with Armstrong watching in silence.

Armstrong wrote later: "We had come to space in the name of all mankind – be they Christians, Jews, Muslims, animists, agnostics or atheists. But at the time I could think of no better way to acknowledge the Apollo 11 experience than by giving thanks to God."

The two men spent 21.5 hours on the lunar surface before rejoining the command module Columbia in lunar orbit. Armstrong's first step onto the lunar surface was broadcast on live TV to a world-wide audience. He described it as "one small step for a man – one giant leap for mankind".

The absent-minded William Spooner

William Archibald Spooner, university lecturer, dean and priest, was born 175 years ago, on 22nd July 1844, in London. Known for his absent-mindedness, he sometimes mixed up the syllables of words, to comic effect. These are now known as spoonerisms.



Spooner was an albino and suffered from defective eyesight. He studied at New College, Oxford, and then lectured there for 60 years in history, philosophy and divinity. He was well liked and respected, kind and hospitable. He was also highly intelligent, and it was suggested that his mind was occasionally too quick for his lips to follow – resulting in the unintended plays on words that made him famous.

Many of those attributed to him are undoubtedly apocryphal, but it is fairly certain that in 1879 he gave out from the pulpit the first line of a hymn as "Kinquering Congs their Titles Take" (instead of 'Conquering Kings their Titles Take'). He is said to have disliked the reputation he gained for getting his words muddled, but at the same time he is believed on occasion to have made the "errors" deliberately.

According to Roy Harrod, Spooner exceeded all the heads of colleges at Cambridge or Oxford that he had known in "scholarship, devotion to duty and wisdom". He died in 1930.

The Fourth of July—Independence Day

Independence Day, or the Fourth of July, is a special day in the USA and celebrates the Declaration of Independence which was signed on July 4th 1776.




That day marked the legal separation of the thirteen American colonies from British rule. These colonies along the Atlantic coast had been settled by the British during the 17th and 18th centuries and were dominated by Protestant English speakers. During the American revolution (1765-1783) the colonies joined together to resist British rule and formed the beginnings of the United States. By 1800, a further 16 territories had joined the Union, with the 50th and final state, Hawaii, joining in 1959.

Independence Day is huge cause for celebration with fireworks, parades, carnivals, and ceremonies happening all across the States.

St Swithun's Day—15th July

St Swithun is the saint you can blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15th July, it will then rain for forty days after that. Swithun was Bishop of Winchester in the 9th century, and famous for his charitable gifts and for building churches. When he was dying in 862, he asked to be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door. But on 15th July 971 Swithun was dug up and moved into the cathedral itself. That same day many people claimed miraculous cures, but the heavens opened. The unusually heavy rain that day, and for days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun. Swithun was moved again in 1093, into the new Winchester cathedral. His shrine was a popular place of pilgrimage throughout the middle ages, although it was destroyed during the Reformation, the shrine was restored in 1962.

The Bible that was thrown away

A Christian pastor was travelling many years ago on a train in the old Soviet Union. There was just one other passenger in the railway car, and soon the two men were chatting. The subject of religion came up, and the other man extolled the logic of atheism and criticised religious belief. The Christian bravely expressed his own views, and even took out his Bible to show the man some relevant verses. But the atheist was both unmoved and annoyed.

As the futility of their argument became clear, the men lapsed into silence. A little later the Christian left the compartment for a few moments to get his suitcase. He returned to find his Bible was missing. The atheist was just closing the train window and it was clear that he had thrown the Bible out. The journey continued the final few miles in stony silence.

A few months later, a man from a neighbouring village came to call on the pastor and asked to be baptised. The pastor was astonished and asked him what he knew about such things. The stranger said: "until a few months ago I knew nothing of Christianity. I am just a local builder, working on a site near the railway track. Then suddenly one afternoon a book came flying out of the window of a passing train and landed in the dust nearby. I walked over and picked it up. It was a Bible – the first I had ever seen.

"I took it home and out of curiosity began to read it. I was amazed by what I read, and I have become a Christian and want to be baptised and meet with other Christians." The pastor did indeed baptise the builder and also confided his side of the story of the flying Bible. Within a few years the builder had converted several of his neighbours, and a tiny Christian church had been planted within his own community. All because of a thrown-away Bible.


