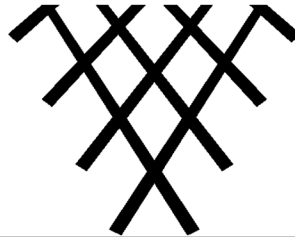

An update on the church re-opening

It is very exciting that congregational worship has restarted at St Peter's church; Palm Sunday was the first service in the church with a congregation since the beginning of January. There are still lots of restrictions in place: numbers are limited, we still have to wear masks, keep our distance from each other, and we can't sing yet.

A major difference is that many in the congregation have now received their first, or even both, vaccinations. So, even though we still have to take precautions and be careful, there is less risk and less fear about the virus spreading.

At the time of writing, we are still on schedule to re-open the building to community groups from 12th April, in line with the government 'roadmap'. Our children's activity providers such as Mini-Maestros, Sapphire Supreme Majorettes, and the Total Sport youth club will be resuming straightaway.

We are awaiting further guidance about our community activities for older people, including the Tuesday lunch club, Stanley Community Singers and Knit & Natter but hope that we will be able to restart those too: we can run the activities in a covid-secure way and have all the necessary risk assessments and precautions in place.

We have not made any plans yet about our coffee mornings, other fund raising events and the pantomime, except that we are unlikely to hold a summer gala this year, at least, not on our usual date at the end of June.


Chelsea Flower Show moves to the autumn



For the first time ever in its 108-year history, Chelsea Flower Show will not be held in the Spring, but in the Autumn. The 2021 Chelsea Flower Show will now take place from 21st to 26th September. The Royal Horticultural Society, the show organisers, will still hold it at the Royal Hospital in Chelsea. The hope is that by September, millions more people will be vaccinated, so that mass outdoor events will be able to happen safely. 140,000 people are predicted to attend this year's Chelsea, over the six days. Sue Biggs, RHS director general, says: "We believe many designers and nurseries will look forward to working with different plants that would not be available or at their best in May. We will do our utmost to deliver a beautiful, uplifting and different RHS Chelsea safely in September 2021."

An update from the Stanley Residents' Group
Stanley in bloom!

There may be residents of our village who have been surprised by the appearance of flowers around the village in recent years in springtime and wondered about their origins.



The answer is that they are the work of the Stanley Residents' Group!

The Group was formed in 2012 with the aim of protecting and enhancing the local environment and has worked since the beginning to provide, amongst other projects, floral displays around the area.

Their planting of spring flowering bulbs, such as daffodils, narcissus and crocus began initially along Aberford Road, spreading over recent years to Lee Moor Road, Rooks Nest Road and Lime Pit Lane, and then into the centre of the village with displays on the 'green' at Lane Ends—at the junction of Lake Lock Road, Long Causeway and Orchard Ave. Additional planting for 2021 has been on Lime Pit Lane and Ferry Lane.

The spring flowers have been complemented by the hanging baskets around the village. Some 50 are planned for 2021 (to include Canal Lane, Baker Lane and Ferry Lane) in addition to previous sites in the centre of the village. The look of the village has also been improved by the provision of a Community Garden opposite the Community Centre and planted tubs on the Lane Ends green and Mount Road. Illuminated Christmas trees were added to lampposts in 2020.

This work has taken considerable effort by the Stanley Residents' Group, as well as significant donations and sponsorship from local businesses and individuals. Any offers of help, and sponsorship for 2021 and future years would be very welcome. Our first ever National Park

Seventy years ago, on 17th April 1951, the Peak District National Park was established. It was Britain's first national park, and it was formed partly as a result of a mass trespass on Kinder Scout, the highest point of the park, just under 20 years earlier, which helped gain open access to moorland that had previously been in private hands and closed to walkers. The precise effect and extent of the trespass, in which Young Communists were prominent, is still widely disputed by rambling associations.

The Peak District is mostly in Derbyshire, but includes parts of Cheshire, Greater Manchester, Staffordshire and Yorkshire. It is usually split into the higher Dark Peak and the gentler White Peak, in the centre and south of the district. Altogether it covers 555 square miles: it is reckoned that 20 million people live within an hour's journey of it.

It contains only one town, Bakewell, but several others, such as Buxton, are on the fringes. It is now the fifth largest of the 13 national parks in England and Wales. The land within it is a mixture of public and private ownership, and there are many planning restrictions imposed by the national park authority to prevent inappropriate development.

Thank you to the Stanley volunteers!

It was on 20th March last year, that a few people in Stanley got together and set up the Stanley Covid-19 Mutual Aid WF3 volunteer group. Since then, the group has carried out an extraordinary 1,367 individual acts of kindness in our community, all carried out by around 40 dedicated volunteers.

The beginning of the lockdown in March 2020 brought the realisation that many people might be stuck in their homes for weeks and weeks: either shielding to avoid the virus, or self isolating because of a positive case in the home. Up and down the UK, thousands of volunteer groups were set up by public spirited people to help those in their immediate communities that might need help. Nobody realised then that these groups would be needed for a whole year!

The Stanley mutual aid group was set up initially by individuals from Stanley Residents group and St Peter's church. A Facebook page, dedicated mobile phone and email address were quickly set up, and posters and leaflets were designed and distributed. Guidance on how to operate the group was sought, such as how to recruit volunteers, and covid-safe guidelines on how to hand over shopping and prescriptions.

The day to day running of the volunteer group was taken on by Tom Sparke, who manned the phone line 7 days a week, assigned tasks to the volunteers, and set up a logging and reporting system. We are extremely grateful for the hard work that Tom put in at the beginning to help get the group up and running. Tom handed over the running of the group to his parents Sally and Sean, who very capably stepped into his shoes and have been running the group since last summer.

Since March 2020, the Stanley volunteers have:

- Collected 124 prescriptions from various chemists and delivered them to people's houses.
- Carried out 113 supermarket shopping requests
- Made 389 befriending phone calls
- Delivered 645 hot meals (from St Peter's church and Ma B's)



There have been a further 96 acts of kindness which have included delivering food parcels, jigsaws, medical equipment, Christmas hampers, as well as dog walking, and even hanging curtains!

Around 610 of the hot meals were cooked by St Peter's church and delivered to elderly people and those in need. From March to July the church delivered 390 lunches and since Christmas it has delivered a further 220 lunches. The church is very grateful to Alternative Care Ltd for their support and co-operation over the past year; the hot meal deliveries would not have been possible without them.

Ma B's café on Lime Pit Lane also stepped in and has been making meal deliveries to local people in need throughout the pandemic. Sam Carney at The Travellers organised a food drop at the pub and personally delivered food parcels to local people. Sam was also instrumental in organising the toy and jigsaw shelter outside Stanley nursery.

The volunteer group also organised a collection point for toiletries for patients in hospital; books and pens for the children's ward; and handmade matching hearts for those separated by hospital stays.

Over the past year the volunteer group has developed very close links with a number of other local organisations. We have received a considerable amount of practical and moral support from Wakefield council and from our local councillors, and have also referred individuals to the council and other agencies for financial or caring support.

Nova Wakefield, who support charities and community groups in the Wakefield district, have also been extremely helpful. They have been collecting information on all the activities carried out across Wakefield during the pandemic. They also helped St Peter's church with some successful grant applications.

Calls to the volunteer groups and requests for help have dwindled considerably over recent weeks. However, the group will remain in place for the time being until we can be more certain about how things are going to go over the next few months. Some of the telephone befrienders have decided to continue with their phone calls as they have become such good friends with those they have been supporting!

It only remains to give a very sincere thank you to every single person who has helped their neighbours, friends and community over the past year. We can all be very proud of every little thing we have done to help someone else; whether the support was practical or emotional. We have all been affected by the events of the past year in some form or another, but every good deed we have done, or received, will have made the difficulties just a little easier to bear.

Chocolate – food of the gods!

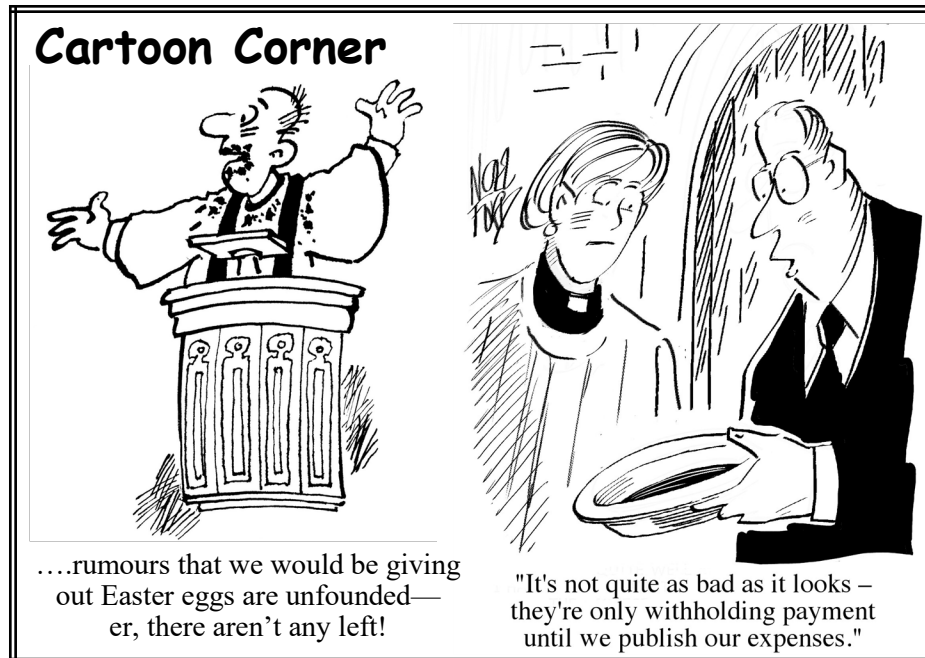
The botanical name for the cocoa bean is Theobroma, which means ‘food of the gods.’ Millions of us obviously agree; half a million tons of it are consumed in Britain each year alone. Chocolate makes us feel better. The chemicals it contains trigger the release of endorphins similar to those we naturally produce when we fall in love.



But nutritionists warn against using chocolate as a pick-me-up, especially in the evening. Chocolate eaten before bedtime can cause blood glucose levels to plummet during the night, which will disrupt your sleep. Chocolate eaten in quantity every day can lead to mood and energy swings, weight gain and poor immunity. If you have mad cravings for it, you could have a problem with blood sugar, or a deficiency in magnesium, copper, zinc or iron.

But occasional consumption of cocoa can provide medical benefits. Chocolate containing 60 per cent or more cocoa solids is rich in essential trace elements and nutrients such as iron, calcium and potassium, and many vitamins. Cocoa is also the highest natural source of magnesium.

Good as all this may be – most of us enjoy chocolate simply because of its high sugar and caffeine content. Chocolate simply gives you an instant sugar hit, providing a sudden burst in energy, unfortunately followed by a slump and the desire for another sugar-fix.
