

It was gratifying to see so many people there, and an unexpected £481 was raised for which we are extremely grateful. It was good to meet old friends in such a friendly atmosphere, and also to greet new faces who had reached out to us. We were also delighted to welcome Councillor Matthew Morley.

Conversation was far ranging and highlighted common problems, such as the fear of venturing out since the pandemic, especially into crowded places. This has led to reduced congregations and fewer people offering their help; the situation faced by Stanley Methodist Chapel is not an isolated case but typical of that faced by all places of worship. Another issue raised was the lack of availability of premises for hire by organisations and individuals.

We had no idea how many people might come along, and so were prudent with our refreshment planning; as a result the cake stall sold out completely!

We hope to schedule a Candlelight carol service with a brass band in the run-up to Christmas. If the planning comes off, we will publicise it locally on noticeboards and on the Stanley Facebook page.

St Peter's Church is a Co--op 'Local Cause'

St Peter's church is delighted to be selected by the Co-op stores as a 'Local Cause'. This means that over the next 11 months, the church will receive a penny for every £ spent by Co-op members in our local stores (Stanley, Outwood & Woodlesford).

The church is following in the footsteps of the Stanley Residents Group which was a Local Cause last year, and received £7,850 towards the excellent work they are doing to develop our local environment (see page 14 for more information about SRG).

We initially submitted an application to become a Local Cause to support our Community Pantomime, which we have been staging for over 15 years. We intend to use some of the money that we receive towards the expensive task of cleaning, repairing and maintaining our enormous store of costumes. The funds that we receive through the Co-op Community Fund will make a huge difference to our on-going work in our community: providing a church, community building and activities which are accessible to every member of our community.

Over the next 11 months we will be promoting our community activities in the local Co-op stores, with posters and displays. In the meantime, you can support our cause by becoming a Co-op member, and by selecting St Peter's church as your local cause.

If you shop regularly at the Stanley or Outwood Co-op stores, you can become a member by going to www.coop.co.uk/membership. Once you have set yourself up as a member, you can go to 'Choose a local cause': select St Peter's Church, Stanley as your local cause, and the church will immediately start to receive a penny for every £ you spend in the Co-op. The scheme will run until November 2022 so there is plenty of time.

We would like to thank the Co-op for selecting St Peter's Church as a local cause and for all their support and advice. We would also like to thank our local councillors Jacqui Williams, Matthew Morley and Jack Hemingway for their recent support in helping us secure a £500 grant from Wakefield Council to cover some of the costs of staging this year's Mother Goose pantomime.

Stanley Residents' Group update

The SRG was delighted to be selected as one of the local causes supported by the Co-op and its members in 2020-21. We put in a bid for funding to support local community gardening projects to bring the community together and improve our environment, and we are

thrilled to have received over £7,850.

Some of the money has already been used to kick start the Community Orchard on Mount Road, where volunteers have planted apple, pear and plum trees and will soon dig in soft fruit canes. Stanley Grove Primary School and local people have sponsored some of the individual trees leaving more funds available for the wider plans to enhance this area, to bring to life its heritage as the old railway cutting passing under the bridge.

Plans are also afoot to refurbish the raised beds outside Cross Keys and to install new planters at the entrances to Stanley. The group has given away free spring bulbs and small tree whips to locals to plant in their own gardens. Plans are now being developed to implement these and other ideas arising from consultation with locals, and there is additional bonus prize money to add to the pot from the SRG Love Where You Live award for a Community Group. Everyone is welcome to contribute brains or brawn to all of these projects over the coming months.

The SRG was disappointed to learn that it is no longer permissible to place small lit Christmas trees in memory of loved ones on lamp posts throughout Stanley or the wider district. In its stead, the SRG has teamed up with Stanley Library to enable locals to place names of ones we have loved and lost on the Christmas tree in the library. Everyone is welcome to visit the library between December 6th and 24th to write a name on one of the tags decorated by local children.

The great work of St Columba

It was 1500 years ago, on 7th December 521, that St Columba, an Irish missionary who spread Christianity in Scotland and the North of England, was born in what is now County Donegal. He became a missionary after he and his 12 followers landed on Iona, a tiny island off the west coast of Scotland, built a Celtic church and estab-

lished a monastic community. Iona quickly became known throughout Europe as a missionary centre and school, and is still a place of pilgrimage to this day. He and those associated with him spread the gospel more than any other religious pioneers in Britain. The name Columba is Latin for 'dove'.

A Christmas Gift

The Revd Canon Paul Hardingham considers the gifts of the Magi

It's not easy getting the right Christmas present for others, especially in these uncertain times. However, the Magi's gifts were entirely appropriate and help us to understand God's gift of Jesus to us.

"On coming to the house, they saw the child with His mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped Him. Then they opened their treasures and presented Him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh." (Matt 2:11). These were the expensive kind of gifts that visitors from the east would bring: gold, frankincense (a plant gum resin used in incense) and myrrh (another resin used in perfumes).

Who is He?

Gold is a gift for a king. In Jesus, we see a king in baby clothes. The worship of the wise men was costly, not only in terms of their gifts but for their lives.

Why did He come?

Frankincense was used by the priests in the temple in offering sacrifices. Jesus, as the ultimate priest, is the one who came to bring God and man together. He could do this because He is both divine and human.

What did it cost Him?

Myrrh was used to embalm the dead. This gift reminds us that the baby of Bethlehem would die on the cross to give His life for us. The wood of the crib and the cross are the same wood!

What are we going to offer Him this Christmas? Jesus is Christ, the king who comes to rule our lives; He's Lord, the One who knows what it's like to be human as well as divine; and He's Saviour, who enables us to be friends of God.

Was Jesus really born on 25th December?

Almost certainly not. But the story of how that date came to be chosen as Jesus's birthday is one that stretches back long before his birth. It seems to have started on the Greek island of Rhodes in 283 BC. That year the solstice fell on 25th December, and it was also the year that the Ancient World's largest Sun God statue, the 34 metre, 200 tonne Colossus of Rhodes, was consecrated. By 46 BC, Julius Caesar had made 25th December the official winter solstice. In AD 274, the Roman Emperer Aureilian chose the winter solstice to be the birthday of the Sun God. He also decreed that Sol Invictus (the unconquered sun) was 'Lord of the Roman Empire'.

50 years after that, Constantine became the first pro-Christian Roman Emperor. He wanted the Church to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ on 25thbDecember. Perhaps he felt that Jesus was more or less the same person as the mighty Sun God. Or perhaps he felt that the ancient Sun God's association with goodness, light, warmth and life would help ease the people's transition from paganism to Christianity.

Whatever the reason, the Church went along with it, and chose 25th December to be the date of Christmas. And in an ancient mosaic in the crypt of St Peter's Cathedral, Jesus is portrayed as adorned with sun rays and riding in a chariot – just like Sol Invictus. As for the huge, bronze 200 tonne Sol Invictus? He fell over during an earthquake and was sold off for scrap metal in 654AD by an enterprising Arab scrap merchant. Meanwhile, Jesus lives on...

Look out for Wenceslas on 26th December

Many of us will recall JM Neale's well-known carol: "Good King Wenceslas looked out, on the Feast of Stephen, when the snow lay round about, deep and crisp and even". But did you know that Wenceslas was a real person, a duke, and effectively king of Bohemia in the 10th century? In modern terms, he was Czechoslovakian. He was a generous and kind monarch, deeply Christian and given to good works. The enormously popular carol written by Victorian hymn-writer JM Neale describes the monarch braving the bitter weather to take food and fuel to a poor man living rough. Whilst the story was probably fictitious, it is at least in line with what is known about King Wenceslas' character. It also perfectly expressed the Victorian Christian ideals of benevolence and almsgiving.
