

Dear Friends, On Sunday 17th July at 3pm we will gather on the field at St Peter's Church for our second Pet Thanksgiving Service. I have been involved in Pet blessing services for many years and have always found them a real opportunity to give thanks to God for our animal companions and the joy and friendship they bring to our lives. Pet services can have their moments though and for several years whilst I was at St Michael's, East Ardsley we had Morley Exotic Animal Rescue with us. At one of the visits we ended up with a Komodo dragon joining us along with some tarantulas. I think it was one of the quietest services ever as all the dogs and cats looked on as if to say "What on earth is that walking around? We don't normally see one of these on our daily walk or in our garden!"

Our friends Dave and Marion at St Peter's are currently training Esme the Labrador to be a Guide Dog. It is quite a considerable undertaking but we all know what a valuable help and companion a guide dog can be to a blind or partially sighted person. The dog will help their owners remain mobile, independent, safe and secure.

It goes without saying that animals can be very therapeutic and help us in many ways in our own daily lives. I know of a man who after various sad events in his life, retreated very much to his house and lost all interest in going out and engaging with the wider world. Family and friends were very concerned about his mental health until somebody suggested getting a dog. Well, to say it transformed his life is an understatement. After several weeks his mood had changed; he now had a focus to his life and on his daily walks he made several friends with other dog walkers and enjoyed chatting away to them.



In our service we will say this prayer together which will also remind us of our great responsibility to look after God's creation:

Generous God, whose own self-giving is reflected in the love and devotion of these animal companions; bless them with your Spirit, and make us mindful of the great responsibility we bear for all creatures dependent upon us for their welfare; help us to use our power over them for their own benefit and never selfishly for our own gain. Amen.

So dear friends, do consider joining us on Sunday 17th July at 3pm on the field for our special pet blessing service. We will also be joined by the Leeds, Wakefield and District RSPCA who will have an information stall. I look forward to seeing you there or at any other service or event we are holding over the summer months – take care, God bless and hope you have a good summer.



This year marks 75 years of the Edinburgh International Festival

The first Edinburgh Festival was held in 1947. It was the idea of the then General Manager of Glyndebourne Opera, Henry Harvey Wood, as well as civic leaders. Their aim was to establish "a world class cultural event" that would bring together audiences and artistes from around the world. The Edinburgh Fringe festival began the same year as an alternative, open festival, with no restrictions on performers and using unusual venues.



Stanley Gala—Saturday 6th August

A true story—from John Wilbur Chapman

Back in 1893, Chapman was a Presbyterian minister from Richmond, Indiana. He told of how one evening he was travelling by train in a rural part of Kansas. The only other passenger in the carriage was a very agitated young man. He kept glancing out of the window and wringing his hands. Finally, Chapman asked if he could help.

Reluctantly, the young man explained how he had run away from home many years ago. He had not contacted his parents for many years and now he was afraid they wouldn't want him back. He had written home some weeks before and told them he would be travelling on this train. At a certain point it passed very close to his home. In the letter he had begged his parents' forgiveness and asked that if they wanted him to come home, they were to tie a yellow ribbon on the old apple tree that grew right beside the railway lines.



“Sir,” he said, “the train will soon pass my home but I’m afraid to look. If there’s a yellow ribbon on the tree, I’ll get off at the next station and go home. If there’s no ribbon, I’ll just travel on. But I’m too afraid to look out for the tree.” So Chapman offered to look for him. The young man hid his eyes and Chapman kept watch.

“You can open your eyes now,” he said a few minutes later. “All is well,” said the evangelist. “There is a yellow ribbon on the apple tree. In fact, there’s far more than one. Every branch is hanging with yellow ribbons, scores and scores of them. Your parents love you so much and want you to come home.” How, if parents can love their wayward children like that, how much greater is the love of God! Truly, we are loved with everlasting love.

Sea Sunday—10th July

Over many years the 2nd Sunday of July has been kept as Sea Sunday, with a special focus on prayer for all seafarers. The Mission to Seafarers supports the work of sailors facing difficult waters, piracy, and separation from loved ones for long periods at sea. However, we can also experience storms in our own lives.

In Acts 27 we read how Paul was being taken as a prisoner to Rome, when he was caught in a storm off Crete. After 14 days they were shipwrecked on the island of Malta. Paul had warned the crew that it wasn't a safe time of year to sail: "I can see that our voyage is going to be disastrous and bring great loss to ship and cargo, and to our own lives." But his words were ignored, and the ship sailed into a violent storm.

By the third day they 'finally gave up all hope of being saved'. How do we face up to storms in our lives? Do we worry and panic? God doesn't necessarily prevent storms from taking place, but we can trust His purpose through them.

Paul urged the sailors to "keep courage, because not one of you will be lost, only the ship will be destroyed". His confidence rested on an angelic promise: "Do not be afraid, Paul. You must stand trial before Caesar; and God has graciously given you the lives of all who sail with you." Only the sovereign God, who created the wind and waves, can promise to save people from a storm. What does this mean for us in our circumstances today?

Look around your home. How much of the contents in your cupboards, wardrobe, rooms, and even garage came to you over the seas, via the great merchant and container ships? What would your home be like without them? Yet when did you last give a thought to the people who bring them to you?



It is a curious fact that seafarers are one of the most important, and yet invisible, people groups in our society. We all of us depend on them to fill our homes and businesses with an endless variety of goods, and yet we never see them, never speak to them, and rarely even remember their existence.

It suddenly makes Sea Sunday seem good sense: an annual opportunity to give thanks for the seafarers of the world, and to pray for their personal well-being. For going to sea is a lonely occupation. It separates families for months on end. It can sometimes be dangerous, and it is always physically demanding work.

So this month, on Sea Sunday, let's pause and give thanks to God for the seafarers of the world. Let's remember how their work so enriches our lives. Let's pray for them, for their families, and let's support the organisations that offer them care and support through their chaplaincy work.

In doing so, we will join with thousands of other Christians, from London to Lagos, Manila to Melbourne and Durban to Dunkirk, who each year remember the seafarers who make our prosperity possible.






Reaching the deepest place on earth *by Tim Lenton*

One hundred years ago, on 28th July 1922, Jacques Piccard, the Swiss oceanographer and engineer, was born in Belgium. He is best known for developing deep-sea submarines, and for becoming one of the first two people to reach the Mariana Trench, the deepest point on earth.

He came from a family known for daring achievements. His father Auguste set height records in ballooning, reaching the stratosphere, and later with his son adapted the technology involved in that achievement to create the bathyscaphe for deep sea exploration. As a result, the Piccard family made both the highest flight and the deepest dive.

Jacques Piccard taught economics at the University of Geneva before leaving to concentrate on deep sea research. His revolutionary vessel, developed with his father, was bought by the US Navy for salvage and rescue.



On 23rd January, 1960, Piccard and Lt Don Walsh, a submarine officer, descended to 35,800 feet in a chasm of the Marianas Trench known as Challenger Deep. There were no on-board experiments or scientific equipment. They finally touched down in “snuff-coloured ooze” where they found, amazingly, a flat fish and a new type of shrimp.

The Piccards followed this success by developing further vessels, including tourist submarines and another exploratory vessel that followed the Gulf Stream and studied its various features. Jacques Piccard, who died in 2008, also formed the Foundation for the Study and Preservation of Seas and Lakes. His son Bertrand, with Brian Jones, made the first non-stop circumnavigation of the world by balloon in 1999 (Switzerland-Egypt, 20 days).

A handful of walnuts may help reduce your feelings of hunger. Walnuts are unique among nuts in that they are mainly comprised of polyunsaturated fats, which help decrease ghrelin, a hormone that increases hunger. They also seem to increase peptide YY (PYY), a hormone that increases fullness or satiety. As appetite hormones play an important part in regulating how much you eat, this could be good news. As one scientist says, walnuts “may favourably change appetite hormones so that we can feel fuller for longer.”

A sermon in sand by Rev Richard Higginbottom

If you are fortunate enough to get to the seaside this summer, then you might like to wriggle your toes in the warm sand, and consider this: it has been said that there are more stars in the universe than there are grains of sand on all the beaches and deserts in the world.

Astronomers recently estimated that there are about 70,000 million, million, million stars in the universe—a number that is far too big for us to imagine!

The Sun is actually a fairly ordinary star, although incredibly vast of course, and is 93 million miles away from Earth. It is not easy to grasp that sort of a distance, but here's a measuring stick: if you were to fly in a fast passenger jet at 600 miles per hour, then it would take you about 17 hours to fly from London to Sydney; about 17 days to reach the Moon, and about 17 years to reach the Sun!

As for how long it would take to fly on to the next nearest star to us—Proxima Centauri—it would take about 4.2 light years, as the distance is more than 24 trillion miles! And that is just to the next nearest star after the Sun.



As you sit on the beach this summer, you might care to pick up a couple of grains of sand. Let the first grain represent our Sun, the second grain the next nearest star to us. Then look at the whole beach and after that consider all the beaches and deserts on Earth, with every grain of sand representing a star then it gives some meaning to the phrase “God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth.”
