
Remember to change your clocks on Sunday 26th March




Welcome to the March edition of our benefice magazine which Dear Friends, again covers lots of news and activities across our four churches. We are now in Lent, and over the forty days we will reflect on Jesus' life in the wilderness and the temptations he faced, and our journey of discipleship.

Several years ago on a trip to the Holy Land, I decided to scoop up some of the Judean desert and placed it in a jam jar to bring home. As I went through security in Tel Aviv airport I thought perhaps I should mention it to the security guard. His response was that people often pinch a bit of desert but there's plenty to go around so it's okay. It has served as a visual aid in talks and assemblies for many years and it gives one a little sense of what life in the desert might be like: the contrast between the heat of the day and the coldness of the night, and the sheer bareness of the desert. Life in the desert would have little in the way of luxury and one would have to focus on the essentials: survival, and what is really important in life.

In the past, Lent for many people has involved going without certain things, but interestingly many contemporary Christians push back against the idea of "giving" something up" and instead suggest that we "take something on." Rather than seeing Lent as a period of denial and deprivation, they suggest we view Lent as an invitation to commit to positive actions, like volunteering, donating money, or practicing deeper contemplation. Proponents of this view point out that by virtue of committing to something new, we also give something else up. We sacrifice our time and commit it to service, or to God. It may be an approach to consider for us this Lent....

During Lent we shall be holding a series of Lent groups at different times and places across the benefice (see opposite). In



how his relationship with his Father sustained him and blessed him. All of us at some stage in our lives have wilderness experiences and the Lent groups will look at different aspects of our faith and how they sustain and support us at these times.

In other news we shall have Bishop Tony Robinson with us at each of the four Sundays in March (see opposite), and it will be an opportunity for us to share in worship and have fellowship afterwards. Further news about the vacancy will follow in due course but in the meantime please pray for the benefice and for those involved in the day to day running of the benefice during the vacancy – many thanks. 



50th Anniversary Service for the Lofthouse Pit Disaster

Saturday 18th March, 11am

On 21st March 1973, seven men were killed when the seam they were working was flooded by 3 million gallons of water after they cut into an abandoned shaft. During its years of operation, around 80 men died at the pit, and a steel obelisk in the Lofthouse Colliery Nature Park marks the spot above

ground where the 7 men died in 1973.

The service at Out-



on Saturday 18th March at 11am will be led by Bishop Tony Robinson and will be attended by local dignitaries, ex-miners and families of those who died. At 12pm there will be a procession, plus pipe band, along Church Lane and Potovens Lane to the miners' wheel on Ridings Way. Afterwards there will be refreshments at Outwood Memorial Hall and music from Lofthouse 2000 Brass Band, and at 5pm, a performance by Skelmanthorpe Male Voice Choir; no ticket required—donations only.

Some church improvements!

You will have noticed that some scaffolding was erected around the church recently. This was to facilitate repairs to the roof, ahead of the work that we hope to carry out on the main window—for which we are trying to secure a grant. The scaffolding has now been taken down.

A Lasting Impression

"I like it here. I'm going to ask my mummy to bring me again" - words of a smiling seven-year-old girl from one of the three Year 1 and 2 classes from the Wrenthorpe Academy who recently visited St Anne's Church. "We must have done something right," is the reaction of Lynn Fowley and Stuart Millington who were privileged to host the visits.

These three visits were arranged at the request of the school and were part of their exploration of different faiths. In this case, of course, it was to answer such questions as "What is a Church?" "What do Christians believe?" "What do we find in a church?" "What do the various symbols mean?"

Lynn had gone to great lengths to produce numerous visual aids, including power points, to help the children get answers to these questions at a level they could understand - and to make it fun! For example, they enjoyed exploring God's work of creation by each adding a picture they had been given to a floor collage showing the wonder and variety of the natural world. It was clear that Lynn's efforts paid off as the children's attention was held throughout the almost 2 hours each class was in the Church.

Stuart talked about the building, its furniture and what each item is used for. He then spoke about the symbols we have in church and what they represent. He next "baptised" a doll, "married" a couple (the bride looking radiant in her veil, the groom looking dapper sporting a dickie bow) and he spoke about the bread and wine of Holy Communion.

Then, much to the delight of the children, he transformed their teacher into a priest ready to preside at Holy Communion! (First came the dog-collar, followed by an alb, a stole and finally a chasuble). The teachers too enjoy this and couldn't stop smiling!

Lynn also spoke about the Bible, ending with Jesus' parable of the Lost Sheep, pointing out that the shepherd's care for this one sheep is like God's care for each of us.

But then, to bring the point home the children were asked to try and find the lost sheep that was "hiding" somewhere in the church. In addition, as a lasting reminder of the parable and as a momento of their visit, Lynn invited the children to make a sheep of their own using pre-formed woolly bodies on which they stuck a face and eyes. The delight on their faces was clear for all to see!

Finally, Stuart said the Lord's Prayer (noting this was the prayer that Jesus taught us) and everyone was invited to light a prayer candle while holding someone special to them in their minds. Amazingly the church fell silent as one by one each child and then their teachers and accompanying adults stepped forward to take the taper and light a candle.

Like the animals going into the Ark two by two, so the children left the church to walk back to school each clutching their sheep. Judging by the chatter and the laughter disappearing up the road their time in St Anne's had been most enjoyable and, we pray, had left a positive and lasting impression on them about the Church and her faith in God made known to us in Jesus Christ.

Remembering Sir Christopher Wren

It was 300 years ago, on 8th March 1723, that English architect Sir Christopher Wren died at the age of 90. Best known for designing St Paul's Cathedral, he was also a ground-breaking anatomist, astronomer and physicist. He was a founder of the Royal Society and served as its president from 1680 to 1682. He was highly regarded by such eminent scientists as Isaac Newton and Blaise Pascal, but it is as an architect that he is best known. St Paul's, completed in 1710, was regarded as his masterpiece, but he also directed the rebuilding of 52 churches after the Great Fire of London in 1666.

Born at East Knoyle in Wiltshire, he was a sickly child but lived a long life, marrying twice, although both his wives died very early – one of smallpox and the other of tuberculosis. Although Wren



lived 90 years, he was married for only nine of them, but had four children.

Two factors may have contributed to Wren's success as an architect: there was certainly a dearth of architects in the mid-17th century; but also the Great Fire of London necessitated so much rebuilding that it gave him the opportunity to shine.

The first crossing of Antarctica

The first land crossing of Antarctica was completed 65 years ago, on 2nd March 1958, by the Commonwealth Trans-Antarctic Expedition, led by Sir Vivian Fuchs. The team of 12 men travelled 2,158 miles from Shackleton Base to Scott Base (via the South Pole) in 99 days, using six vehicles.

The journey – nearly 22 miles a day, much of it in appalling conditions and obstructed by huge crevasses – started from the Weddell Sea and ended at McMurdo Sound. It was well prepared and strongly supported. The advance team at the Shackleton Base had to over-winter in weather much more severe than they had anticipated, but still they remained healthy.

Mount Everest conqueror Edmund Hillary, starting at the 'end', was responsi-

ble for laying supplies for the crossing party and forging a route for vehicles through the western mountains, but he and his group also made an unscheduled dash for the Pole, becoming in the process the third group to reach it, and the first to do so in vehicles.

The expedition had been timed to cash in on the worldwide interest created by the International Geophysical Year, a global project designed to stimulate scientific co-operation. Under the

patronage of Queen Elizabeth II, the expedition was funded by the UK, New Zealand, Australia and South Africa. The continent was not crossed again until 1981.

Fuchs, whose determination was key to the expedition's success, was the son of a German immigrant and his British wife. He was educated as a geologist – a profession he chose so that he could pursue his interest in the outdoors. He was knighted on his return to the UK and became one of very few explorers to whom the Royal Geographical Society has awarded a Special Gold Medal. He also became Director of the British Antarctic Survey until 1973 and was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society the following year.
